goods for the U. S. mutual security administration.
Britain's exports to Red China jumped from \$334,000 in the first two months of 1952 to \$5,700,000 in the first two months of this year—an increase of about 1,700 per cent.

This testimony came from the committee's assistant counsel, Robert F. Kennedy, who said much of his information came from the U. S. office of naval intelligence in London, the British government ordered a wide inquiry into the alleged sale of the ships.

The foreign office, which said it had no comment yet, asked the admiralty, ministry of transport and the colonial office to investigate the charges.

Charges Laid In Jail Breaking At Summerside

—On Tuesday evening a number of charges were laid against five prisoners in Prince County Jail who were involved in a jail break escape early last Thursday morning, and they will appear again before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q. C. Tomorrow morning for preliminary hearing.

Charges were laid against Claude and Gerald McKenna of Bloomfield; Arthur Cannon, Duvar; and Enos Perry and John Arthur Gallant of Summerside. All are charged, with breaking jail and four are charged with breaking and entering at O'Leary on the previous night.

The stores involved are those of MacWilliams & Turner, and Claude McNeill. A charge of car theft has also been laid against several of them.

In a preliminary hearing on the same evening, Frederick Charles Peters of Summerside, was committed for trial in the Supreme Court on a charge of jail breaking. Court Hears Confession In Montreal Murder Case

MONTREAL, (CP) — Detectives undressed her, put her in a tub after a court of Queen's jury Wednesday a statement in which Marie Paule Langlais, 26, said he killed her husband, a man with a bloody face, in a Montreal hotel.

Lieut. Ubaldo Legault, head of the Provincial Police homicide squad in Montreal, said the statement was obtained from Genest Feb. 25.

Lieut. Legault said Genest said after the death of his wife in 1951 he had lived with Miss Langlais.

Describing what happened on the day of the slaying, Genest said in the statement he had taken his woman to his garage to help him wash his car.

"She began to bawl me out, and took up a baseball bat," Lieut. Legault quoted from the statement. "I grabbed the bat from her, Mr. Justice Wilfred Laurie with and hit her on the head. Then I the jury out of the court."

Churchill Side-Steps Atomic Bomb Discussion

LONDON, (Reuters) — Prime Minister Churchill side-stepped opposition demands Wednesday that his government inform the United States it is opposed to use of the atomic bomb in Korea.

Labor member Arthur Henderson asked the Prime Minister in the House of Commons to "make it clear on behalf of the people and government of this country that he will not tolerate use of the atomic bomb for the purpose of carrying on this United States war in Korea."

Churchill replied: "I don't think that really is the way in which this grave issue should be dealt with."

When Opposition members shouted "why not?" Churchill said he could not provide the reasons.

Churchill had spoken in answer to a question about the possible use of the atomic bomb in Korea and had said all possible means of deciding the Korean problem were being continuously discussed.

Dominion Stores Record Earnings

TORONTO, (CP) — Dominion Stores Limited reported record net earnings of \$2,077,038 or 15¢ a share for the year ended March 31, 1953, compared with \$1,808,476 or 14¢ a share the previous year. Sales reached a peak of \$120,646,715, compared with the previous year's \$99,781,680. Working capital increased to \$8,206,068 from \$5,423,217.

J. William Horsey, President, said Wednesday five new mammoth markets were started during the year, several more were planned, and 59 stores were modernized. At March 31, 202 stores were operating in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Canadian Cannery Report Earnings

HAMILTON, (CP) — Canadian Cannery Limited have announced net earnings of \$1,195,433 or 23.5¢ a share for the year ended Feb. 28, 1953. This is a drop from the preceding year's earnings of \$1,719,259 or \$3.67 a share.

W. I. Drynan, president, said Wednesday profits declined because prices were lowered to meet competition in Canada and imported canned goods.

The company paid \$936,274 or \$2 a share to shareholders. Working capital was \$12,750,866, compared with \$13,538,278 last year.
