The Future of Canada.

Let those who are despondent and inclined to regard the prospects of this Canada of ours with doubt, read the following from the report of Mr. Cowan—one of the Scotch delegates who visited this country last year. In closing his report, Mr. Cowan says:—

"And now to sum up briefly, to those who think of emigrating to Canada, I would say that in my opinion the Dominion has the advantage of being nearer to England than any of her other colonies, that to which ever of her Provinces they may go, they will meet with the kindest, most hospitable people on the face of the earth; they are also as loyal subjects as Her Gracious Majesty the Queen has in any part of her vast dominions; they will go to a land of immense mineral as well as agricultural resources yet to be developed; a land that has a great future before it, and which, I feel assured, will some day become one of the mightiest countries on the face of the earth."

Mr. Cowan has given evidence of the sincerity of this belief by himself emigrating to Canada.

Politics in Quebec.

WHILE politicians here are resting, those of Quebec are working hard. On the 21st—for the good of the country, no doubt—no less than six motions of want of confidence were made in the Quebec Legislature. They were all voted down—the Government majority being nine and eleven.

The Bradlaugh Case.

THIS case may be regarded as settled—for the present. The House of Commons will not permit the Atheist either to make an oath in the potency of which he does not believe or to make an affirmation which is not provided for by the law. Bradlaugh cannot, therefore, take his seat; and yet he is not declared to be unseated. The position is somewhat awkward.

Model School Statistics.

NUMBER ON THE ROLL—PRIZE LIST.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR,—A well-written and timely letter, on the subject of alleged frauds against the Customs, appeared in your issue of the 21st inst., over the signature of "Fair Dealer." To this letter our Collector of Customs, evidently in a towering rage that any one should dare to express an opinion without first consulting him, has seen fit to reply in an exceedingly ungrammatical and awkwardly constructed effusion. It is difficult to arrive at the Collector's exact meaning; but I think that what he desires to make out is, that "Fair Dealer's" letter has been written, not with a desire to see fair dealing upheld, but as a purely personal attack upon himself.

Now, Mr. Editor, I have no connection with "Fair Dealer;" I do not know who he is, nor what grounds he has for the charges he makes; but I think that I am safe in stating that nothing can be more baseless than the Collector's assumptions in this matter, and that instead of futilely endeavoring to pour out the vials of his wrath upon "Fair Dealer's" devoted head, he should feel grateful to him for supplying a cue which may lead to a big "find."

It is evident that Mr. Currie has an obliging disposition which will be of some service to him in his new duties. Hear him:—

"Fair Dealer" has made six grand charges against "some ports in this Province," which in justice to myself and the officers connected with the Customs, I will not allow to go unchallenged, provided he publishes his real name and the "Ports in this Province" where the "Egg Case Fraud" he alludes to is being carried on, and answers the six following questions based on the subject matter of his letter:—

Really such suavity is refreshing, such condescension charming! Mr. Currie then goes on, "as he himself hath said it," to propound six questions, but which must rather be looked upon as making six demands. What the result will be, when the six questions are fully answered and other details strictly complied with, the public are left to imagine, but we suppose some person or some thing will be "challenged."

Past experience may have taught Mr. Currie to regard an informer as little better than a thief, but this doctrine will not hold good in his new profession. Has it never struck the Collector that were his ridiculous demands complied with, he would then be obliged, by virtue of his oath of office, to act upon the information given, and would then in all probability find that "his bird had flown?"

In concluding his letter, "Fair Dealer" plainly said:

"I have refrained thus far from either naming any particular locality where such fraud is carried on, or even hinting at the names of the parties concerned. But, nevertheless, if more positive evidence is required to substantiate what I have written, I am ready and willing to come to the front."

This, I take it, is all that Mr. Currie should require as a starting point; and were he disposed to arrive at the truth of the matter, instead of rushing into print, thus giving the matter notoriety and allowing the offender time to cover up his tracks, his proper course would have been to have waited upon you, when you, Mr. Editor, would doubtless have given him such information as to enable him to tell where next to direct his inquiries.

There are many other points contained in this specimen of the Collector's scholastic attainments, which might be commented upon did time permit, but I imagine that "Fair Dealer" will not require any assistance, and will be able would fully answer the Collector, and, therefore, I simply remark upon the letter as it strikes a
