Sir ROBERT HODGSON, Knight,

Administrator and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island, Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice-Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Island stands prorogued until Thursday, the Twenty-fourth day of December, instant:

I have thought fit, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued until THURSDAY, the Twenty-eighth day of JANUARY next, of which all persons concerned are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of this Island, at Charlottetown, in the said Island, this Twenty-third day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty eight, and in the thirty-second year of Her Majesty's reign.
