THE TENDENCY OF TRADE.

The National Policy has been particularly to promote interprovincial trade and trade with Great Britain.

It is to be remembered that the imports of Canada are composed of raw materials and manufactured goods.

Thus, under a tariff for revenue only, the United States sent us one-third of the articles enumerated above and Great Britain two-thirds.

Thus, under the National Policy, which has been denounced as hostile to and discriminating against trade with Great Britain, our imports of the same articles were \$25,200,000 more than in 1873 than in 1875, and that in the face of a large development of home manufactures.

It will, we think, be admitted that the present conditions are better for trade with Great Britain than they were in the time of a tariff for revenue.

It is our interest and duty to encourage trade with the Mother Country.

Let us, then, maintain the present conditions rather than those which existed in 1873; and when we do make a change, let it rather be in the direction of preferential trade with Great Britain.
