

### Equality Demanded For Indians

VANCOUVER (CP) — Justice and equality for Indians is demanded in a brief to the royal commission on bilingualism and multiculturalism from the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union (Ind.).

"Canadian Indians are shamefully discriminated against," the union says, "and compelled to live in poverty, squalor and filth without hope."

"Jobs and income opportunities for them are very limited."

The British Columbia union, whose membership of 2,000 includes many Indians says the proposed federal Indian claims commission should compensate tribes in cash and land for the white man's injustices and breaches of faith.

The brief argues against any deadline for finalizing Indian claims and says the awards of the proposed commission should be subject to appeals to the United Nations or an international court.

The union also recommends subsidized housing, promotion of secondary industries and improved education for reserves. It calls for an end to discrimination against Indians in employment and welfare services.

### Commission Will Probe Territories

OTTAWA (CP) — A commission of inquiry into the political and economic future of the Northwest Territories has been named in the Commons by Northern Affairs Minister Loring.

Mr. Loring said the three-man commission headed by Dean A. W. R. Carrothers, 42, of the University of Western Ontario will seek the views of residents of the north and recommend to the government steps required to provide a greater measure of self-government to the Territories.

John W. Parker, Mayor of Yellowknife, will be a second member of the commission. A third member probably will be drawn from Quebec, he said.

The commission's terms of reference include the study of views of northern residents and other Canadians with northern experience, the federal government's responsibility in the north, consideration of the political development of the Territories having regard to size, nature and distribution of population and ability to pay a significant share of the costs involved, and previous proposals affecting constitutional structure.

Mr. Loring noted that there has been no geographical change in the make-up of the Territories since 1912.

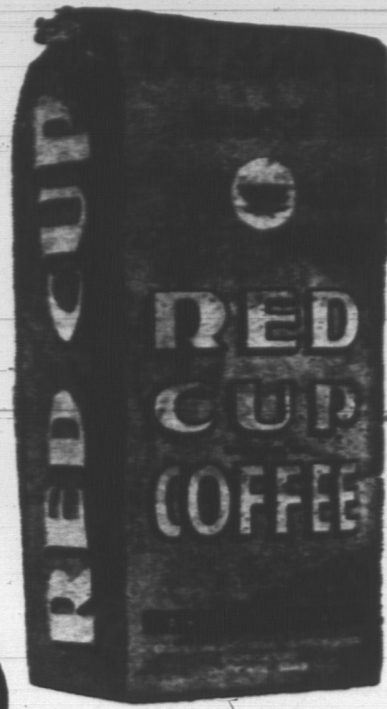

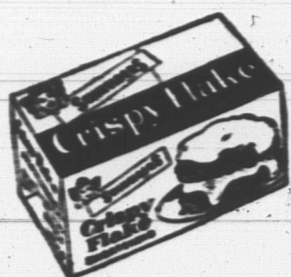
