Mollet Stakes Life Of Gov't

PARIS (Reuters)—Socialist Premier Guy Mollet Friday staked the life of his government on its rejection of a proposal to adjourn a debate on increased old-age pensions.

The national assembly will vote on the formal issue of confidence next Wednesday afternoon. The pension increases would cost about 140,000,000,000 francs (\$350,000,000) a year, to be financed by tax increases.

The present minimum pension of 134,320 francs (\$335) a year would be increased to 162,000 francs (\$405) under the proposed legislation.

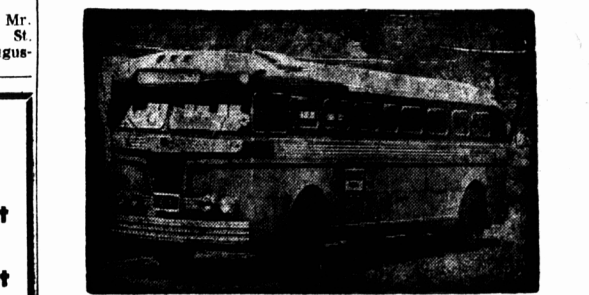
