Union Recognizes Choice Of George Hillier As Alternate

TORONTO (CP)—The Amateur Athletic Union of Canada Sunday recognized the choice of marathon runner George Hillier of St. John's Newfoundland, as first alternate member of the Canadian Olympic track and field team.
The approval, given during the final day of the AAU's annual meeting here, followed a telegraph ballot by members of the union's national track and field committee, ordered Friday following the endorsing of Fred Rowell of Vancouver, national track and field chairman.
Rowell previously had appointed two members of the Olympic team, as well as Hillier to the alternate position, without consulting the committee.
Results of the ballot were described by Rowell as "virtually unanimous" for Hillier.
CLOSER TO STANDARD
The track and field selection committee had chosen Toronto pole-vaulter, Ron Miller, as first alternate, previous to Rowell's selection of Hillier. Rowell said he picked Hillier because he came relatively closer to the Olympic standard in the marathon event than Miller had in pole vault trials.
Hillier missed the standard of two hours and 35 minutes by one minute and five seconds. Miller missed the 13-foot-nine-inch pole vault mark by three inches.
After passing the motion Friday, the AAU approved the addition of high jumper Alice Whitty of Vancouver to the team. President Ken McKenzie of Vancouver said approval of Alex Oakley of St. John's, and Toronto, was automatic when he bettered the walking standard in trials.
The meeting decided to send a formal explanation of the AAU's action in the Hillier case to President Smallwood of Newfoundland. A letter from Mr. Smallwood supported a protest by the Newfoundland branch, lodged after Hillier was left off the team.
Word of their decision to name Hillier first alternate will also go to the Canadian Olympic Association, with a request that he be included on the team.

Ottawa Offers Frank Clair 3-year Contract

OTTAWA (CP)—Rough Rider coach Frank Clair has been offered a three-year contract by the Ottawa football club, it was learned Friday.
It is considered unlikely, however, that Clair will decide whether to accept the offer before the football season ends.
Clair, former coach of Toronto Argonauts, now is in the first year of an original two-year contract with the Ottawa Big Four club. This agreement would be torn up to make way for the new, extended agreement.
Rough Rider general manager Jim McCaffrey has indicated that the coach also is in line for a raise in salary, now estimated at \$12,000 a year. Clair received a \$1,000 bonus for getting the Rough Riders into the playoffs, something they hadn't done since 1951 when they went all the way to take the Grey Cup against Saskatchewan Roughriders.

Montreal Canadiens broke loose with a five-goal spurge in the first period Saturday night and wound up with a 6-0 home victory over Chicago Black Hawks. It was the third shutout of the National Hockey League season for goalie Jacques Plante.
In Toronto, Detroit Red Wings took a disputed 3-1 victory from the Maple Leafs in Metro Prystal's third period goal. The game was thrown into an uproar when officials disallowed a Leaf goal a split second after the final bell.
TWO FOR ROCKET
Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Bert Olmstead counted two goals each for Montreal and Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffron and Bobbie Moore scored the others. Richard's two ran his lifetime total to 46.
The Hawks tightened their defensive works after the disastrous first period and gave goalie Al Rollins better protection. But the steady move was too late and Plante took care of the Hawks' particularly drives by Forbes Kenedy, Eddie Litzberger, and Ken Mondell.
Gave Stewart, former NHL player, made his Montreal debut as a recree and handed out only one penalty, a minor to Claude Provost of Montreal for hooking.
CUSTOMERS PROTEST

Q.S.S. Blanks Q.C.H.S. 13-0 To Win Fourth Straight Game

Fred Driscoll's powerful Queen Square School rugger swept to a 13-0 victory over Queen Charlotte High School in the first game of the city rugby finals Saturday to run their unbeaten string to four games and maintain unblemished their untied record upon record.
The victory gave Queen Square a 1-0 lead in the best-of-three playoff.
Q.S.S. rolled to an 8-0 lead at halftime on two tries and a convert and sailed the contest away in the second half with another try and a penalty kick.
The Tigers controlled the play for the best part of the game and school three-quarterly Eugene "Oodie" Hayes gave Q.S.S. a 3-0 lead in the first five minutes when he plunged across the high school line with a couple only occasionally did the high of tacklers on his back. Ralph Russell was almost the man who soiled the big Q.S.S. record midway through the second half when he scooped up a Q.S.S. fumble and appeared on his way for a try. Fullback Vince Mulligan was the only man to beat a grip on an ankle as Russell sped by to thwart the attempt.

BOSTON (CP)—Jerry Toppazzini scored two goals on clever manoeuvres as Boston Bruins took a 4-1 decision over New York Rangers Sunday night in a brawling National Hockey League game which included eight major fighting calls among 16 penalties.
The Bruins broke open the contest with three goals after the Rangers had tied the score 1-1 at 2:50 of the third period.
Johnny Peiron restored the Bruins' lead 34 seconds later by jamming a rebound over fallen goalie Lorne Worsley in a game which had the 12,045 Boston Garden fans screaming alternately at the flashes of brilliant hockey and at the fisticuffs.
The fighting started after Peiron's tie-breaking goal. Danny Lewicki of New York and Leo Boivin of Boston were sent off at 3:38, and 19 seconds later two men from each side joined them in the bulging penalty box.
