Character Important In RCAF Training

—One of the most important phases of the Navigation Officer Course is officer training. When it is realized that the students are generally selected from high school and university, the necessity of instilling them with high character and leadership qualities becomes extremely apparent. Although these students undergo rigid screening processes at recruiting centres and Manning Depot in Toronto, they have little service knowledge or leadership ability when they commence their flying training. Since flight cadets become fully commissioned officers on graduation, they must be subjected to a type of training which will qualify them for the diverse responsibilities which will be theirs.

This training, aside from conventional lectures on the importance of high character qualifications, takes the form of practical application. The flight cadets are organized in a manner as nearly similar to that of a normal RCAF unit as possible. The entire flight cadet body is responsible to an appointed member of the senior course who is chosen for his outstanding leadership ability, displayed during the previous thirty weeks of training. He, in turn, is responsible to a staff officer for the discipline, morale and welfare of all the flight cadets. To assist him in his duties, other appointments are made to fulfill such responsibilities as the administration of the organization, sports, entertainment, housing, discipline and course magazine and diary.

Members of each course are likewise appointed for short intervals to afford them the opportunity of assuming responsibility and providing leadership. Thus, by the time they become the senior course they are fully capable of taking complete charge of the organization. At the same time, staff assessments of the officer potentiality of individuals have a high degree of accuracy resulting from the opportunity to observe the quality of work displayed under conditions commensurate with those experienced by serving officers.

Through this method of training, the RCAF is ensuring that the future of the service will be in reliable hands. FL Keith Dibble, is the officer in charge of Character and Leadership Department at Summerside.
