

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

SONS OF SCOTLAND.—A meeting will be held in Mr. A. A. McLean's office tonight at 8.30. Important business.

SCOTT ACT REJECTED.—A petition to bring the Scott Act in force in the County of Portneuf, in the province of Quebec, was voted on last week. The electors rejected the petition by a majority of 545.

SCOTTISH GATHERING.—The rush to Summerside on the 18th August to attend the Scottish Games threatens to outrival the rush to the Klondyke gold fields.

DOG TAX.—Executions are being made out for owners of dogs who have not yet paid taxes on their canines. Those interested should make a note of this and pay up at once to save expenses.

THE INDIAN FAMINE FUND.—We notice that out of the \$3,543.83 contributed by the people of this province towards the Indian famine fund, \$100 was retained and paid to Mr. Matthew A. Allan, the secretary. Mr. Allan was appointed by the Local Government, and the least the Government could have done was to have paid him. They had no right to pay Mr. Allan out of the subscriptions sent to the famine fund.

PRESS EXCURSION.—E. S. Stevens of the Sherbrooke Examiner of Sherbrooke, P. Q., secretary-treasurer of the Eastern Townships Press association, is in the city in company with W. H. Price of the I. C. R. making arrangements for the annual excursion of the association. The press party will number between thirty and forty and will leave Sherbrooke on August 13th for Halifax, thence to Sydney, Prince Edwards Island will be visited and St. John will be reached on Saturday morning, August 22nd.—St John Sun.

FARM LABORERS EXCURSION TO THE CANADIAN NORTHWEST.—Owing to the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway taking large numbers of the Northwest laborers and also because of the large increase in the acreage of wheat in Manitoba and the Northwest territories, it is expected large numbers of farm laborers will be required to safely harvest the immense wheat crop of that country. The Canadian Pacific Railway, therefore, contemplates running some very cheap excursions for farm laborers to points in Manitoba and the Northwest, towards the latter part of August. Anyone desiring to see the country cheaply and to work at wheat harvesting would do well to bear the matter in mind and watch for definite announcements of rates, dates of excursions, etc.

DEAD ON THE ROAD.—A valuable horse owned by Mr. Thomas Campbell, of this city, dropped dead on the road at Brighton last evening. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell and Master Arthur Campbell were in the carriage at the time returning from a visit to friends in the country. Near the residence of Hon. Mr. Peters the horse became alarmed at a passing team and started to gallop. Mr. Campbell soon had the horse under control, however, and shortly before the disaster occurred he had settled down to a trot. When near the turn of the road some distance this side of Mr. Weeks' house, the horse fell in the shafts and died almost immediately. The cause of death is not known. The horse was seemingly in excellent condition, and a short time before leaving for the city Mr. Campbell declined a good offer for him.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—Consul-General Lee has informed the state department that in the event of the release of the American, Louis Someliano, now confined in jail at Havana, there will remain of American citizens imprisoned in Cuba, in addition to the five co-accused prisoners, only the following: Manuel Fernandez, confined in Fort Cabanas; Rafael Fernandez Y. Diaz, at Sagua La Grande; Julio Thomas Sainz and Adraumont, at Santiago. All of these prisoners are charged with rebellion with arms in hand, and are held subject to the ordinary military jurisdiction. The United States consul at Manzanillo has cabled the secretary of state a contradiction of the story that Albert Slusser, an American, has been captured by Spanish troops and taken to that place. He says that nothing is known of Slusser's arrest.
