Fine Exhibits Of Pupils' Needlework

Large crowds visited St. Joseph's Convent over the week-end to see the annual exhibition of work by pupils of grades 1 to 9. Drawing much attention, and outstanding in the display again this year, is the exquisite needlework accomplished by children who handle their first needle in grade one. Progress in their work of this type is shown quite clearly throughout the exhibition until in grades 7 and 8 they are making their own clothes.

Grade 2. Knitting, water colors and hand hemmed handkerchiefs. Grades 3 and 4. Attractive colored embroidered runners and aprons.

Grade 5. Hem stitched and embroidered guest towels, hem stitched and initialed pillow cases. In this class is a handkerchief by Patsy MacGregor which took first prize at the Toronto Exhibition.

Grade 6. In this display are a number of aprons which girls have made in readiness for domestic science which they take in Grade 7. There are also woven buffet sets and a class book of the best maps made by pupils during the year.

Grade 7. The pupils start making their own clothes in this grade, and have on display skirts, boleros, caps, ascot scarves and other knitted wear. There are also some slippers which are pupils' first work with sewing machine.

Grade 8. 50 woolen jumper dresses and broadcloth blouses make up a large part of this display. In addition to this sewing, the pupils have an exhibition of handicraft which is well abreast of the times. In this display are a number of hats which will no doubt start a new trend in the headgear of the teen agers of this community.

Grade 9 has a very fine display of hemstitched and monogrammed altar linens.

MR. MCLURE. Continued from page 1. did not require me. What I want to deal with tonight is the matter of historic sites. I want to say a word about an historic site in connection with the Rustico-Cavendish National Park.

"Every member of this committee knows that associated with the nearby National Park is the home and birthplace of our great author, Lucy Maud Montgomery. In Queens, made vacant by the death of Liberal J.L. Douglas, there are two candidates. Cecil Miller is running for the Liberals and J. Angus MacLean for the Progressive Conservatives.

The seat, one of the few dual constituencies, has almost consistently had one Progressive Conservative and one Liberal in the Commons. W. Chester S. McLure, a Progressive Conservative, now is one of the constituency's representatives.

A three-way fight is shaping up in Winnipeg South Centre, made vacant when Ralph Maybank, a Liberal, resigned to return to private law practice. Mr. Maybank held the seat from 1938.

Norman Wright, 45-year-old school teacher, has been nominated by the Liberals. Gordon Church-ill, 52, a lawyer with front-line service in the two world wars, is the former member of the Manitoba Legislature, has been nominated by the Progressive Conservatives. The C.C.F. has chosen Charles Biesick, 47, a Canadian National Railway boiler-maker. Mr. Biesick also is co-editor of the Manitoba Commonwealth, a C.C.F. publication.
