## TEACHERS IN COUNCIL.

### Natural Science in the Schools.

(CONTINUED FROM SATURDAY'S ISSUE.)

Mr. McSwain—We have listened with real pleasure to an excellent essay on the study of natural science in our schools. I am very glad that we have the co-operation of our friend Mr. Bain in this very important matter. We all know that at present there is a very limited amount of science taught in the schools, our teachers having received but a limited instruction in science. The teachers are obliged to pass an examination in French, Latin, Mathematics, etc.; and in school most of their time is occupied in teaching those branches together with English. Such being the case, how is it possible for them to study and teach natural science? Under the present course of study they are obliged to impart instruction to their pupils in the subjects prescribed, although they know that the subjects taught are not always the most useful or the best suited for them. For my own part, I had prepared a collection of plants and insects, and had made preparation for class instruction thereon, but under the present course of study I find that I am scarcely able to do anything in scientific instruction, with the exception of a few lessons in botany. It is surprising, however, what progress can be made in a short time in such study. In my opinion, easy lessons in science should be given in the very lowest grades in our schools. If this instruction were carried throughout all the higher grades, the pupils would accumulate an immense amount of information, and that, in my opinion, is perfectly clear, and that is, under the present arrangement our teachers are not to blame for the neglect of scientific subjects. They have scarcely time enough to carry out the present school course. We are behind the other provinces in this respect. In New Brunswick the schools are making progress in the study of Natural Science, while we in P. E. Island are only beginning to take it up. What is remarkable about our present arrangement is that Agriculture is required to be taught in the City Schools. Now, would it not be much better to impart instruction in those schools in the mechanical arts and similar lines, than to let the pupils to study a branch which will never practically benefit them? I must congratulate Mr. Bain on his excellent paper.

Mr. N. McLeod—I move that the thanks of this association be presented to Mr. Bain for his excellent paper, and for his efforts to disseminate Natural Science all over this Province. Motion seconded by Mr. Seaman, and put and carried unanimously.

Mr. Bain received the resolution from so intelligent a body as the Teachers' Convention of this Province, with thanks. He thought the teachers should be fully awakened to the fact that it was a necessity that our young people be taught Natural Science. In the United States, the number studying that branch has increased twenty-fold during the past twenty years. It is now admitted on all sides that our best thoughts are derived from the field of nature. The first step that should be taken is to secure a really competent teacher of science for the Prince of Wales College. That, and that alone, will start us fairly in this department of study.

A steel screw steamer named the Quadra, built for the Canadian Government by Messrs. Fleming and Ferguson, of Paisley, Scotland, went on her trial trip on the Clyde on September 28. The Glasgow Herald says: "On the measured mile she attained a speed of 12 knots, which gave much satisfaction, being a knot in excess of her guaranteed speed. Her dimensions are: 190 ft. by 30 ft. by 14 ft. 6 in. Her armament will consist of four swivel guns with complete equipment. The Quadra is intended for service on the Canadian Pacific coast, and will be commanded by Capt. Walbran, of the Canadian navy. The Quadra has been fitted by the builders with a set of their patent quadruple engines. The vessel and her engines have been constructed under the superintendance of Mr. Lawrence Hill, C. E., surveyor for the Canadian Government.
