ISLAND PRODUCE.—The New Glasgow Vindicator says: The schooner St. Thomas, with oats, etc., from P. E. Island, which was aground at the mouth of the river, was pulled off this morning by the Egerton, and towed here. The schooner Neil Dow, with hay, etc., consigned to P. M. Jenkins & Co., arrived in the harbor to-day and will come up the river to-morrow.

POTATOES, EGGS AND BUTTER.—The farmers in the Annapolis Valley have this spring furnished the United States market with about 26,000 bushels of potatoes. There remains yet to be forwarded about 3,000 bushels. Eggs are selling in Annapolis at 12 cents per dozen. It would be very difficult says a traveller, to find a worse quality of butter than is now to be found on the tables of Nova Scotia hotels.—Globe.

SPIRITUAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Political Notes.

OTTAWA, May 3.

Mr. Ryker's resignation on Friday as member for Lincoln and Niagara, makes four vacancies, though one of them will be filled by member-elect Mackintosh for Ottawa city, who will take his seat on Tuesday.

Dalton McCarthy has threatened to renew the language discussion when the Western Territories Bill will come before the House by moving, in Senator Belle-rose's steps, to strike out the clause embodying the compromise adopted by the House.

Mr. Blake has also promised to move that the elections in the Territories shall be held under the ballot system.

The best authorities argue that prorogation can hardly take place before the 14th, and that it may even go over the Ascension Day holiday, in which case the Queen's Birthday may be at hand before the buildings on Parliament Hill are left to the solitude.

At the last ministerial caucus the question of immigration was the principal measure taken up. It was unanimously decided that the time had arrived when prompt measures must be taken to encourage active immigration into Canada. With this end in view, the Government have been engaged in promulgating their plans. It is understood that they have completed such arrangements, and that a handsome sum to further immigration into Canada will be placed in the supplementary estimates, which are expected to be laid on the table any day this week.

Big Labor Demonstration.

LONDON, May 4.

To-day's labor demonstration in Hyde Park was a magnificent success, and exceeded, in point of numbers and enthusiasm, all of this class of gatherings since the great reform assemblage of 1866. The splendid organization of the different sections taking part in the processions brought together in the park half a million of people, who met, went through the business, and dispersed without a single disorderly incident. The largest procession was organized on the Thames embankment. It is estimated that 150,000 men participated in that, and 20,000 in the other processions. Speeches were made from 13 platforms. The processions started for Hyde Park at 3 p. m., and after parade formed around the platforms. Speaking commenced at 4 o'clock. Resolutions demanding that eight hours be recognized as a days work were carried amid acclamations. By five, when the parades re-formed in line, the assemblage began to disperse. The speakers included Mr. Davitt, Mr. Cunningham, Mr. Graham, John Burns, Thomas Mann, Benj. Tillet, Mrs. Arling and Annie Besant. By six o'clock the park was cleared and the thoroughfares were full of orderly crowds going straight homeward.

A Captain Fined.

HALIFAX, May 4.

United States Consul-General Fryer received a cablegram from Newfoundland, to-day, giving the result of the trial of the Gloucester schooner Howard Holbrooke for violating the new regulations promulgated by the government of Newfoundland in regard to the purchase of bait. The trial was held before the captain of the revenue cutter which seized the Holbrooke at Harbor Briton, who is clothed with judicial powers. Captain Dominique was fined \$500 or three months' imprisonment, and the vessel and her supply of herring confiscated. The rest of the crew were released. United States Consul Mallory has entered an appeal to the Southern District Court, presided over by Judge Bennett, which meets in September. Meanwhile bonds are offered for the release of the captain and vessel, and the best counsel in St. John's have been retained.

New Submarine Cable.

HALIFAX, May 4.

Authoritative announcement is made that arrangements for the new submarine cable, to connect Bermuda and Halifax, are completed, and that the cable will be laid down early in June by the steamer Westmeath.
