



LOCKHEED UNVEILS MOCKUP OF PROPOSED SU PERSONIC PLANE

This plywood dummy of a proposed supersonic transport capable of flying 266 persons at speeds of 1800 miles an hour, was unveiled Monday in Burbank, Calif., by Lockheed Aircraft Corp. The plane is Lockheed's entry in a design competition with Boeing for a federal contract to build two experimental models. The plane has a beak-like nose which bends down 15 degrees to give the pilot better visibility during take-off, landing and in subsonic flight. In "up" position, pilot's visibility is through side windows of nose. With nose down, he sees straight ahead through windshield.

Millions Said Victim Silent Heart Ailment

CHICAGO (AP)—Millions of persons who feel and appear well are victims of "silent" coronary artery disease that produces no symptoms and is difficult to detect, it was reported Monday. The report was made by the annual convention of the American Medical Association by Dr. Arthur M. Master, consultant cardiologist at the Mount Sinai Hospital, New York, and Dr. Arthur J. Geller, instructor in medicine at the Bergen Pines Hospital, Paramus, N.J. They said: "The widespread incidence of coronary artery disease is well recognized but the prevalence of an asymptomatic (without symptoms) form of significant degree has not been appreciated. It seems to us that no fewer than four to six per cent of all (American) people, 35 years

and older, have significant silent coronary artery disease. "The medical profession must recognize this as a crucial factor in the control of coronary disease in general." The doctors based their conclusions on post-mortem studies of apparently healthy young Americans killed in war who were found to have hardening of the arteries, on electrocardiographic surveys and on studies by other medical investigators. They said routine use of the electrocardiogram is the best means of detecting coronary disease, but if the results appear normal, the patient should be examined again after exercise to test heart function. "To unmask silent heart disease the doctors advocated that all men and women, 35 years of age and older have an annual checkup, including physical examination, x-rays and fluoroscopy of the chest, and a resting electrocardiogram. If the electrocardiogram is normal, they said, the patient should take an exercise test to determine heart function or motion picture x-rays should be taken of the beating heart.

Ont. Farmers Postpone Protests

TORONTO (CP)—Farmers protesting low milk prices will leave the highways to the automobiles for the next couple of weeks while they rush to finish their hay. But once the hay is done the tractor demonstrations will resume, Ontario Farmers Union officials said Monday. OFU President John Dollmer said farmers plan a mass demonstration in about 10 days with the legislature building the probable target. He said as many as 1,000 tractors could converge on Queen's Park. The farmers are seeking a firm price of \$4 a hundredweight for milk supplied for use in the production of butter and cheese. The price is currently \$3.25, plus a 75-cent government subsidy, but farmers are charged as much as 30 cents a hundredweight for shipping to manufacturers.

N. Ireland Tensions Growing

BELFAST (AP)—Prime Minister Terence O'Neill returned Monday from a vacation in France to face growing tensions between Northern Ireland's bitterly divided Protestant and Roman Catholic extremists. In Belfast, the capital, all police leave has been cancelled for the visit next weekend of the Queen. Authorities fear Catholic reprisals in the wake of Sunday's shooting of three Catholics in a Protestant area. One of the three, 16-year-old Patrick Ward, was killed. The others were seriously wounded. Police pulled in five men for questioning Monday night. Political and religious leaders of all factions have appealed for calm. But the situation has been aggravated by repeated efforts that Protestant extremists have taken arms, calling themselves the Ulster Volunteer Force, as a counterpart to the outlawed Irish Republican Army. The Queen, temporal head of the Anglican Church, is due here Sunday for the dedication of a bridge.
