Hawks Seek 4th Win Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—It's beginning to appear that Chicago Black Hawks, with a blend of promising rookies and major league castoffs, are jelling after four dismal NHL hockey league seasons.

Hawks, atop the standing with a record of three victories and a tie, seek their fourth consecutive triumph today against Detroit Red Wings in Chicago Stadium.

If the Hawks—picked by most experts to repeat their fifth place finish of last season—do wind up a Stanley Cup contender, it will be their first such role since the 1952-53 season.

And if success does finally strike the Hawks, much credit must go to general manager Tommy Ivan. Ivan came to Chicago at the beginning of the 1954-55 season, after coaching the Wings to six consecutive world titles and set about to rebuild the tattered Hawk franchise.

AMPLE BACKING Backed by the ample bank rolls of James D. Norris and Arthur Wirtz, Ivan started a farm system, a project which has been

shunned by the team's previous management.

Although three members of the current Hawks—centre Bobby Hull, defenceman Elmer Vasko and rookie Johnny McKenzie—are products of embryonic farm system, Ivan still has had to rely on castoffs and minor leaguers.

For example, three men playing a major part in the team's early success were picked up by Ivan at the NHL summer draft meetings. They include defencemen Al Arbour, Jack Evans and Dollard St. Laurent.

Arbour was Detroit property, Evans had been a New York regular, and St. Laurent was one of the Montreal Canadiens' mainstays for several years.

Ivan grabbed each at the \$15,000 draft price.

VASKO INJURED Vasko suffered a shoulder separation Thursday night at Detroit and will be sidelined for about two weeks. His spot in the Hawk erarguard will be taken by Dollard St. Laurent, until now a spare.

"All three of our drafted players have played up to, and occasionally beyond our expectations," said Ivan. They should help our all-star goalie, Glenn Hall, have a much easier time of it this year."

Of the six newcomers with whom Ivan and coach Rudy Pilous started the season, only McKenzie is playing his first professional season. The others came in purchase or trade with other major or minor league clubs.

Pat McMurtry Romps To Easy Win Over Chuvalo

NEW YORK (AP)—Pat McMurtry, staggered in the second round, chopped up young George Chuvalo of Toronto Friday night on the way to a unanimous decision in a blood-spattered 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Chuvalo bled from the nose and cuts around both eyes in the lopsided match. Chuvalo weighed 207 1/2, McMurtry 188 1/2.

After the second round this was strictly no contest with McMurtry, 26-year-old Tacoma, Wash., boxer, romping a home left jab and a right uppercut. Irish Pat took complete control.

Chuvalo, a heavy-legged left hooker, made it interesting for two rounds. A hook to the head staggered McMurtry at the one-minute mark of the second round. Two more hooks thudded home and it seemed for a moment that McMurtry surely must go down. But he shook off the punches

and fans for the first time. He is regarded as one of the sturdiest mittmen to come out of the north shore of New Brunswick in recent years.

Trainor made his last Charlottetown start against Bob Ledley last September and scored a second round K.O. over the Halifax veteran.

The promoter said careful consideration was given to all bouts in an effort to provide a top notch card.

FINDS HIS WEAPON At the start of the third, McMurtry, a rangy fellow who has 32 previous pro fights to Chuvalo's 14, found his weapon. It was his left jab that soon had Chuvalo the slugger, backing up

instead of crowding. Soon Chuvalo was breathing hard with his mouth open, coughing periodically as though the blood from his red nose hindered his breathing.

All three officials had McMurtry way out in front. Referee Ruby Goldstein scored it 8-1-1, giving Chuvalo only the second with the first even. Voting Artie Aidala had it 7-3, judge the first, second and ninth to the Canadian. Judge Frank Forbes' card of 8-2 gave McMurtry all but the first and ninth. The AP 8-2 card showed only the first and second for Chuvalo.

CHUVALO FAVORED Chuvalo went into the ring as a 9 to 5 favorite as both men made their first New York appearances. Chuvalo also had an

1874-pound edge in the weights but was short on knowhow. At times he floundered like an amateur.

In the ninth, Chuvalo realized his only chance was a knockout. He came out swinging from the heels—but missing. Once he swung so hard he spun all the way around and fell down. At this stage of the fight, McMurtry was playing it cautiously, taking no chances with his sure victory.

Before the decision was made known by ring announcer Johnny Addie, McMurtry was over Chuvalo's corner.

"He's a good clean boy," he said to the Canadian's corner crew. I wouldn't want to meet him a year from now."

TOO MUCH SKILL McMurtry simply had too much skill for this youngster Friday night. Still, Chuvalo always was dangerous for he had that potential in his left hand.

Chuvalo's nose was a smear of red from the fourth round. He had a cut over the left eye in the fifth and another cut under the right eye in the last two rounds. His left eye was closing

fast at the end. At the end of the seventh, Dr. Alexander Schiff of the New York State Athletic Commission, was called in to examine Chuvalo at referee Goldstein's suggestion.

McMurtry now has a 30-2-1 record for 33 fights since he came out of the marines to become a pro boxer. Only Willie Pastrano and Willie Best no't have beaten him. Chuvalo's record now is 11-3-1. He had lost to Howard King (his third pro fight) and Bob Baker before this one.
