

Digging Newspaper Basement Find Early Fortifications

MONTREAL (CP) — Several stone walls bared in excavation work on a new office for the daily newspaper La Presse are believed to be the fortifications thrown up in the early 18th century around Montreal.

Curator Louis Carrier of the Chateau de Ramezay believes the walls, found remarkably well preserved, may well be those built by Chaussegros de Léry, one of the engineers of Louis XV of France. Part of his belief is based on a book called Montreal and Its Fortifications, written in 1874 by Alfred Sandham of Montreal.

The La Presse construction site is at St. Lawrence Boulevard, which roughly halves the present-day Montreal north and south, and crosses the street. It is near the water-front in the area populated in the early days of French domination.

The book contains de Léry's plan of the fortifications around Montreal in 1717-23, listing and depicting various bastions, gates and buildings within the enclosure.

Several small streams ran at that time along what now is Craig

Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP) — A last-hour rally failed to pull the stock market from its first decline in more than a week today but eased the lower trend. Base metals and western oils, which had index losses through most of the session, advanced narrowly.

Many dealers cashed in on high prices of the week.

Noranda gained 1 1/2 points among senior base metals and Hudson Bay a point. Falconbridge was down a point and International Nickel 1/2. Strerritt Gordon lost 15 cents.

Investment climbed 90 cents among junior base metals. Violamac was up 19 cents. New Royran, Copper Cliff, Merrill Island, Consolidated Halliwell and Belcher added about 10 cents. Coast Copper was up 25 cents and Advocate 20 cents. Lake Dufault and Temagami dipped 10 cents.

Pronto lost 30 cents among uranium. Consolidated Denison was off 20 cents. Northspan and Milliken Lake declined 10 cents. Hollinger lost 1/2 among golds. Lake Shore was down 35 cents and Buteho 30 cents.

Husky featured western oils, gaining 60 cents. Central Leduc advanced 20 cents and Dome Exploration, Sapphire Petroleum and Consolidated Mac Mac 15 cents.

Index changes: golds down 58.07.35; base metals up 11 to 25.54; western oils up .20 to 162.69.

Report Juvenile Giant Arrested

MONTREAL (CP) — The arrest of a juvenile giant, 16 years of age with a height of six-foot-six and a weight of 240 pounds, was reported by police Wednesday.

His mighty forearm, tipped with the nickname "Tiny," the youth specialized in ripping iron grill works and padlocks from fire fronts in suburban Ville LaSalle and Laprairie, said Detective-Lieut. Marcel Patenaude.

He carried off cash registers under each arm and later tipped them into a river, the officer said, adding that he was picked up on a double charge of theft and breaking and entering.

Training to be a wrestler, the youth was arrested Tuesday with two other alleged accomplices and two other men still are sought. Police had to leave their door open because he was too big for the Ville LaSalle jail accommodations.
