

# Bobby Locke Wins British Open Golf Championship

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP)—Arthur D'Arcy (Bobby) Locke won his fourth British open championship Friday on St. Andrews Old Course with 279 strokes, a borrowed driver and a 25-year-old putter.

The great Locke, striding up the fairways wearing plus-fours, a necktie and show white shoes, stockings and shirt, looked like a painting from the 1920s, the golden age of sport.

Almost from the first gun of Friday's shooting the huge, large-stomached, 39-year-old South African was the man of the day. At the finish he was three strokes better than defending champion Peter Thomson of Australia and four strokes better than Eric Brown of Scotland.

Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, Tenn., the best U.S. player in British Open since Ben Hogan won at Carnoustie four years ago, was home with 289 strokes after a final

72. Middlecoff finished in 14th place. Frank Stranahan, the other American who played the last day, also had a final 72 for a 291 total.

**ENDS THOMSON REIGN**

The Locke victory brought an end to the Thomson age. Australia's Peter Thomson had won three British Opens in a row and actually had many old Scots saying it looked as if nobody but Thomson ever would win again.

His 279 over the backbreaking 6,996-yard, par 36-36-72 St. Andrews Old Course equalled the championship record Locke himself had established at Troon in 1950. His rounds of 69-72-68-70 were two strokes better than the best previous score ever made in an open championship on the Old Course. Thomson had set the 281 mark in his 1955 victory.

Locke has been playing golf in Britain since 1936 when he came to St. Andrews from Johannesburg as a boy, only to lose in the first round of the British amateur.

He named a putter his father gave him 25 years ago Calamity Jane in honor of a much more famous Calamity Jane swung by Bobby Jones who won the British Open three times among a great many other titles.

The driver used this week in this series of championships began 97 years ago was borrowed—possibly on a permanent basis—from a golf partner in South Africa.

Locke often plays off the tees with spoons or brasses, seldom risking a longer hitting but more variable driver. But he tried out the friend's driver, liked it and stuck it in his own bag.

Since arriving in Britain in May, he has won the open and two of the bi-weekly tournaments on the local circuit. Seldom has an outside golfer punished the locals so harshly.

**RIGUEL SURPRISES**

With the three veterans—Locke, Thomson and Brown—finishing one-two-three, there was a sur-

prise in the No. 4 spot.

Angel Miguel of Madrid, Spain, was there with a 285 total.

In with 286s were David Thomas, a Welshman, amateur W. D. Smith, Belgium's Flory Van Donck and Scotland's Tom Halliburton.

At 287 were Argentina's Antonio Cerda and England's Henry Cotton and Max Faulkner.

With 288 were Peter Alliss and Harry Westman of England.

Top money was \$2,800. Second money was \$1,400 and third was \$725. Total money was \$10,500.

A great squirming mass of 20,000 people turned out and from the top deck of the Royal and Ancient Clubhouse the gallery could be seen as three slowly moving masses, looking exactly like caterpillars, as they wound up and down the fairways.

For a change the weather was good most of the week and was credited with helping five players shoot 67 which tied the record for the old course.

## Yankees And Dodgers Win

WASHINGTON (AP)—New York Yankees rallied for two runs against Bud Byrnie in the 10th inning Friday night to defeat Washington 5-3. Art Ditmar, who got Roy Sievers to hit into a double play with the bases loaded and one out in the tenth inning, picked up his fourth win in relief.

Pete Ramos, who started for the Senators, had a three-hit shut-out for seven innings but the Yankees clipped him for four straight singles in the eighth to take a 3-2 lead. The Senators had grasped a two-run lead in the fourth inning against Tom Sturdivant when Sievers tripled and Julio Becquer smashed a home run into the centerfield seats.

Tommy Byrne escaped damage in the eighth inning when he fanned pinch hitter Art Schult with the bases loaded for the third out, but Bill Bolling's double and Ed Fitzgerald's pinch single tied the score in the ninth.

Pete Runnels also singled and Byrne hit Clint Courtney to load the bases with one out. Ditmar replaced Byrne and Sievers hit his first pitch to McDougald to start a double play.

CHICAGO (AP)—Home runs by Earl Torgeson, Jim Rivera and Les Moss Friday night spiraled the Chicago White Sox to their biggest scoring spree of the season—a 14-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians before a crowd of 38,744.

The defeat dropped the Tribe to fourth place, but the second-place Sox failed to dent New York's three-game margin. The Yankees edged Washington, 5-3, in 10 innings.

The White Sox rapped three Cleveland pitchers for 14 hits including the three home runs and doubles.

Torgeson, with his second homer of the season, a double and a single, drove in four runs to lead the attack. Rivera, who picked up his eighth homer with a man on in the eighth, drove in three runs while Sammy Eposito and pitcher Jim Wilson had two RBIs each.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Rookie right-hander Don Elston beat Milwaukee's second straight time and Jerry Kindall cracked the first major league home run Friday night as the Chicago Cubs took a 7-4 triumph over the National League's third-place Braves.

Elston scattered eight hits as he claimed his second victory without a defeat, but needed help from Turk Lown in the ninth. His only other triumph came against the Braves earlier in the season. Lown allowed the Braves their ninth hit.

The righthander gave up singles to the first two Braves he faced

but then retired the next 12 batters in order. He struck out five.

The Cubs banged four Milwaukee pitchers for 12 hits. The loss was charged to starter Bob Buhl who was chased in the second with his fourth defeat in 13 decisions.

The only hitting success the Braves had against Elston was Johnny Logan's fourth homer and Hank Aaron's 27th in the ninth inning. Aaron's homer was his seventh in eight games and gave him one more than he had all of last season. The blast also equalled Aaron's all-time high in the majors, reached during the 1955 season.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—An 11th-inning one-out double by Joe Cunningham sent Ken Boyer home with the winning run Friday night and gave the St. Louis Cardinals a 4-3 triumph over Cincinnati and first place in the hot National League pennant race.

Boyer singled and advanced on a sacrifice by Hal Smith to set the stage for the run that enabled the Cardinals to knock the Redlegs out of the league lead.

Vinegar Bend Mizell, who has lost six games in his worst season in the majors, pitched the complete game and was credited with his second victory.

Cunningham's double was off southpaw Don Gross, the third St. Louis pitcher, who was charged with his fifth defeat in nine decisions.

Mizell hurled handsomely as he scattered nine hits, walked four batters and struck out seven. Wally Post was a strikeout victim four consecutive times.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Roy Campanella slammed a three-run homer off Robin Roberts in the eighth inning Friday night and gave the Brooklyn Dodgers a 6-5 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies. The homer was the 23rd of Roberts this season and cost him his fifth straight loss.

Roberts, who last won June 6 and now has a 6-11 record, had survived a shaky first inning to limit the Dodgers to four hits until Gino Cimoli singled opening the eighth.

BOSTON (AP)—Boston infielders Billy Klaus and Frank Malzone guided the Red Sox to a 7-5 victory over Baltimore Friday night after the home forces survived a miserable fourth inning. Gus Triandos homered twice for the Orioles.

The Red Sox broke through the Orioles' Billy Loes for three runs in the sixth inning which decided the outcome.

Rookie third baseman Malzone scored the tying run after beating out an infield hit. Shortstop Klaus delivered a sacrifice fly after hitting his eighth home run earlier in the contest.

# Lew Hoad Wins Second St. Wimbledon Tennis Ch'ship

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Australia's Lew (Little Stone) Hoad swept his second straight Wimbledon tennis championship Friday by crushing his Davis Cup teammate, Ashley Cooper, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2, in the shortest and most one-sided men's final ever in this historic tournament.

Some 17,000 fans packed around the famed centre court watched in amazement as the 22-year-old Aussie ace blasted his 20-year-old rival off the court in just 55 minutes. The crowd included Prince Philip and the Duchess of Kent.

The top-seeded Hoad thus became the first man to capture two successive Wimbledon singles crowns since Don Budge of the United States, another killing hitter, turned the trick in 1937 and 1938.

**ALMOST UNBELIEVABLE**

Hoad's play was almost unbelievable. He dropped his service only twice, and scored with blazing service aces whenever he seemed to feel the urge. And once in the final set his backhand drive was so hard it knocked the racket from Cooper's hand and sent him sprawling.

Lew ran up 3-1 and 5-2 leads in the first set, 4-1 in the second, and after trailing for the first time, 2-1, in the third set, he ran out four straight games for the match. Hoad required only 15 minutes to win the second set.

The feature of today's play will be the all-American women's singles final match between Althea Gibson, 29-year-old pride of Harlem, and Darlene Hard, 21-year-old blonde from Montebello, Calif. Miss Gibson and Miss Hard will make three appearances before royalty. They teamed to gain the doubles final and, with Australian partners, moved into the mixed doubles final.

The Gibson-Hard team started off by routing the young South African pair of Sandra Reynolds and Renee Schurman, 6-2, 6-2, in the women's doubles semi-final. They will meet Australia's Thelma Long and Marty Hawton for the championship.

**HARD AND ROSE WIN**

Miss Hard and lefthanded Mervyn Rose of Australia won their mixed doubles semi-final from Mrs. Long and Luis Ayala, Chile, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3. Althea and Neale Fraser, Australia, first completed a postponed match, winning two games for a 10-8, 9-7 quarter-final triumph over Edda Budge, Germany, and Naretha Kumar, India. Then the Gibson-Fraser combination eliminated Australia's Mary Hellyer and Roy Emerson, 6-4, 6-4, in the semi-finals.

Gardner Mulloy and Budge Patty of the U.S. beat Roger Becker, Britain, and Bob Howe, Australia, 9-7, 7-5, 6-3. They will meet Hoad and Fraser, the Aussie

cup combination in the final. After his brilliant victory, Hoad told reporters: "I have no plan about turning professional. I am a member of the official Australian team so I expect I will go to the United States and anywhere else they send me—at least this year."

But the fair-haired bomber from the back streets of Sydney left the impression that this would be his last year as an amateur. He has an offer of \$100,000 waiting for him as soon as he decides to play for pay.

GREEN WOOD LAKE, N.Y. (AP)—Heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson insists he is training for a 15-round fight and will be "ready for anything" when he takes on his first defence, July 29 against Tom (Hurricane) Jackson at the Polo Grounds in New York.

"It would be nice if I could finish him off," he said at his training camp. "But I'm not predicting any fast finish. I'm training for a 15-round fight. I've seen too many fellows try for easy knockouts, get all tired out and lose. I don't want to lose. I want to win. That's the main thing."

"I've got to be ready for almost any style if fighting. Nobody knows what Jackson's going to do at any time. I've got to be prepared."

## Ford Frick Is Expected To Be Elected Again

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick is expected to be re-elected for another seven-year term at the joint meeting of the major leagues to be held Tuesday at St. Louis.

Frick's first term does not expire until Sept. 21, 1958 but, under baseball law, the leagues must give notice of their intentions a maximum of 18 months or a minimum of 12 months before expiration. The commissioner's salary is \$65,000 per year.

Frick was elected in 1951.

Both the American and National leagues will meet briefly Monday morning before the joint meeting. Frick will meet with the presidents of the five higher minor leagues Wednesday to consider changes in the baseball map that might lead eventually to a third major league.

League presidents to meet with the commissioner are Leslie O'Connor of the Pacific Coast, Frank Shaugnessy of the International, Ed Doherty of the American Association, Dick Butler of the Texas League and Charley Hirth of the Southern Association.
