Hidden Meaning Takes Classic

NEWMARKET, England (AP)—Australian Scoble Broesley steered Hidden Meaning through a record field of jostling jockeys Wednesday and won the 1959 Hidden Meaning. Kinseiditch was running of the Cambridgeshire horse race handicap by two lengths from Hasty Cloud. Forty-six runners—biggest-ever starting field here—set out in a cavalcade of horses on the one-mile, one-furlong turf course. For more than three minutes it looked like a shot from a Hollywood epique. Two furlongs from home Hasty Cloud took the lead. But in the last furlong Hidden Meaning struck the front and raced on to win easily by two lengths. Beverlroom was a short head further back in third place and Kinseiditch was another length and a half away in fourth place. Hidden Meaning, owned by Cmdr. Kenneth Grant and Lord Rehrwick, was 7-to-1 favorite—the first favorite to win since Peltis Royal II won at 5 to 1 in 1957.

Braves Sign Bobby Bragan

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Milwaukee Braves of the National League announced today the signing as manager of former major league baseball player, manager and coach Bobby Bragan. Bragan, who will be 43 Oct. 20, takes over as the Braves' fourth field boss since the club tied for the National League pennant in the regular 1959 season and then lost in a playoff with Los Angeles. He succeeds Birdie Tobetto, who quit with a year to go on his contract to become manager of Cleveland Indians of the American League. 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Als Count On Return Of Don Clark

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes are apparently counting on the return of fullback Don Clark by the end of the month. Clark's 15-day extension on his contract expires Saturday and Dan Pickett, Montreal's director of development, said the club does not plan to put him back on the list. This indicates the club feels virtually certain the club feels backfielder will be fit to play again this season.

His return to the active list would give the Als 16 United States imports, one over the maximum allowed under Canadian Football League rules. Someone would have to be cut, a move coach Perry Moss would hardly consent to, unless he was reasonably confident Clark could fill the spot.

Pickett said, however, that Clark will definitely not play Saturday in Montreal's game at Ottawa. He is expected to return to Montreal's announcement was prompted by a report from Dr. Robert Young, the team physician. He said tests and x-ray studies of Clark's knee injury made "definite improvement approaching complete recovery."

Clark suffered a severe knee injury here Aug. 16 against Ottawa and spent 10 days in hospital.

Alston Is Rehired; Wants Durocher Back

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Los Angeles Dodgers rehired manager Walter Alston Wednesday. The baseball club also announced that Alston wants to retain Leo Durocher as coach despite reports that Durocher had second-guessed Alston after the Dodgers lost the National League playoff. The club's decision to keep Alston was anticipated by many baseball experts, although some felt he was in jeopardy after the Dodgers blew a four-game lead in the final week of the regular season and then lost the playoff to San Francisco Giants.

More surprising, perhaps, than the announcement of Alston's new contract was the manager's decision to retain Durocher. At least one last season, Alston rebuked Durocher for what the manager considered an invasion of his jurisdiction.

Alston was given a one-year contract. He was believed to be making about \$40,000. Alston spoke to reporters via telephone from his home in Dartmouth, Ohio.

Asked directly whether Durocher would be back next season, Alston said: "As far as I know, yes. I'm not sure of the way he worked. No one has convinced me yet he said those things about me. If I had anything to do with it, he'd be back."

Alston said, however, that he rejected offers of \$100,000 from a low electrical worker for his ticket on Hidden Meaning.

Bob Cox of the Toronto suburb of Willowdale, a \$100,000 winner said "I'll believe it when I get the coat."

On the west coast, Larry Colwell, a 23-year-old engine wiper on the British Columbia government ferry Kahloke, hadn't enough cash to buy coffee Tuesday. After the race he was a \$150,000 winner.

Mrs. Colwell quit her stenographer's job immediately, but her husband said he was uncertain what he will do.

In Calgary, a 67-year-old widow of a month, Mrs. C. E. Leonard, was \$150,000 winner. She said she'll use some of the money to educate two Roman Catholic priests in Africa.

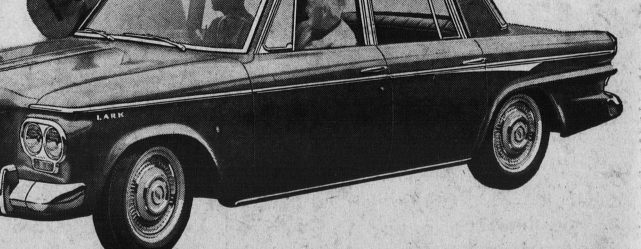
Cards, Cubs Make Swap
