The *Detroit Tribune* gives the following description of a new sort of barrels. The body of the barrel is all made in one piece, from coarse wood pulp. The pressure to which it is subjected is 400 tons. The heads are made of one piece in the same way, and when put together the barrels are exceedingly light, strong, and satisfactory in every way. There are two kinds. One for fruit, flour, and other dry substances; the other for oil, lard and liquids of all kinds. A flour barrel made in this way and filled can be dropped from a wagon to the pavement without injury. Fruit packed in these receptacles keeps longer than when put up in the usual way, being dry and excluded from the air. The barrels for liquid substances are made by subjecting the first form to a simple process, and oil can be kept in them without any leakage. The saving in cost is about fifty per cent.
