The Transvaal War

THE BOY WHO SAVED THE QUEEN.

Few people are aware that Major Gordon Wilson, who is now shut up in Mafeking, with his wife, Lady Sarah Wilson, and their relative, Colonel Baden-Powell, was the plucky Eton boy who so promptly "downed" the lunatic who made a mad attempt to assassinate the Queen at Windsor railway station many years ago. Major Wilson is the son of the millionaire squatter who lived at Ercildoune, near Ballarat, the antipodean Johannesburg of bygone days. After the Windsor episode the Queen naturally took some interest in young Wilson, with the eventful result that she invited his father up to the Castle.

He was then plain Sam Wilson, the rough and mightily rich colonial squatter, and he was subsequently knighted by Her Majesty. "Sir Salmon" Wilson, as he was popularly known, by reason of his introduction of salmon to the Australian rivers, was a big-hearted, genial man, who sat for some years as one of the members of Portsmouth. All Australians regretted that he died before his time; but he has left a worthy son in the gallant officer who so successfully and resourcefully assisted "B.-P." in the defence of isolated Mafeking. He also left a worthy and clever daughter in the person of the beautiful Countess of Huntingdon.

THE LADYSMITH RECORD.

Some idea of the achievement of Sir George White in holding Ladysmith may be obtained from the statistics of the siege. On November 2nd there were in Ladysmith 572 officers and 12,924 men; by March these numbers had been reduced to 403 and 9,761 respectively. There were, all told, no less than 10,668 admissions to hospital, and of these cases 600 died, 393 from enteric fever and 117 from dysentery. In Hospital on March 1st were 1,996 cases, 708 of enteric fever, 341 of dysentery, and 189 wounded. Disease was the worst enemy of the garrison, for there were killed by bombardment only 2 officers and 33 men, while in action and in sorties 35 officers and 353 men met their death. Horses and mules, 5,309 and 4,539 in number on Nov. 2nd, were reduced in four month's siege to 2,900 and 3,713, but there were only 500 effective horses left—these, of course, belonged to the artillery. It is clear that the ammunition must have been hoarded with great care, for the 47 guns had only 42 shells remaining out of an original total of 566. But Sir George White had husbanded his field artillery resources, and doubtless would, if necessary, have made his mark with the 7,200 rounds reserved for an extremity.

A large public meeting at Kimberley held unanimously passed the following resolution:

"This meeting entirely approves the firm and dignified reply of Lord Salisbury to the untruthful statements and inadvisable proposals of the two presidents, and further sincerely declares its honest opinion, based upon intimate knowledge of the past and present situation, that it is imperative, both to Imperial and colonial interests alike, that the republics should cease to exist and territories be annexed to the British Empire." This resolution is merely a single example of the universal feeling among the loyalists throughout South Africa.
