CANADIAN CHEESE.—Canadian cheese has scored a triumph in New South Wales in competition with the native product. Three samples, one of Canadian cheese, one of Bolesia prize cheese, and of cheese recently made at the Hawkesbury agricultural college, were examined by Mr. F. B. Guthrie, analyst to the New South Wales department of agriculture. The chief features of the analysis were as follows: Water. Fat. Case in. Canadian..... 34.50 34.15 27.31 Bolesia..... 35.01 30.44 27.60 College..... 31.06 34.08 27.31 Commenting on these results, Mr. Guthrie says the Canadian cheese proved to be very rich in fat and in splendid condition, and he points out that its composition might well serve as a standard to the attainment of which the efforts of the native cheese makers might be directed. LATEST SUMMERSIDE NEWS.

Special Correspondence of The Examiner. Mr. David Schurman of Charlottetown is in town. Mr. D. W. Henderson, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Division, of P. E. Island, who had been attending the session of that Order at Ellerslie, is in town on Saturday. The congregation of the North Belvedere, Presbyterian Church, have signed a call to Rev. George B. McLeod. A pleasant evening was spent at the residence of Mr. Thos. Beattie, on Friday last. About twenty people were present, and passed the time in games, music, readings, etc. Mr. William Manson returned Friday last, from a visit to the "sports" on the North Shore. He reports a scarcity of geese. The building on Water street, owned by Mr. Jas. A. Sharp, which was damaged by the late fire, is being repaired. Mr. P. McDonald, of Portage, is spending a few days in town. Lobster fishermen are preparing for the coming season's work and are keeping our tin-roofs busy building boilers. The boats lying at the head of Queen's wharf will be shipped to the different fishing stations in a few days. Under the auspices of the Foresters of this town, Rev. G. M. Campbell, of Charlottetown, will deliver a lecture in Market Hall to-morrow night on "Forestry." After the lecture a programme of a musical and literary nature will be given. Officer Peters arrested two young men Saturday night for using profane language on the street. When a few more such arrests are made our streets will be more fit for ladies to promenade. Have you seen the pair of lady's slippers on exhibition in P. T. Fanning's show window? The following announcements were made from the Methodist pulpit yesterday: On Wednesday evening a missionary meeting, conducted by the ladies of the Missionary Society, will be held in Epworth Hall; on Thursday evening a lecture will be given in the hall, admission ten cents. Town Council. At the meeting of the Council, Saturday night, all the Councilors were present, Chairman Hunt presiding. After the reading of accounts, Councillor Goss, seconded by Councillor McNeil, moved that the resignation of John C. McDonald, who has been engaged in conveying steamer Deaver to and from fires, practice, etc. be accepted. Moved by Councillor Baker, seconded by Councillor Goss, that a petition be sent to the Lieutenant Governor and Council asking that the Summerside Incorporation Act of 1885, be amended and that a clause be inserted compelling voters to have their poll taxes paid at least three days previous to civic elections. Councillor Baker read a report of the investigation committee on the state of the Fire Department, stating that the committee had consulted Chief Frizzell and the captains of the fire companies, and find it necessary, for the more efficient equipment of the department, to provide for the Hook and Ladder Company one ladder 20 feet long, three poles 25 feet in length, provided with suitable hooks; one grappling hook, chains, rope, etc., and also to provide a number of requisites for eastern engine. To lessen the confusion at fires, the captains of the different companies were ordered to do all work at fires under the direction of the chief. It was also thought that the companies should drill more, that they might be more capable at fires. Moved by Councillor Compton, seconded by Councillor McNeil, that Watson Clark be appointed assessor of town accounts in place of Leonard Morris, resigned. Moved in amendment by Councillor Goss, seconded by Councillor Baker, that D. McKinnon be appointed assessor. For amendment, Baker, Goss, Lefurgey, says, Compton, Campbell, McNeil, Chairman Hunt gave his casting vote in favor of McKinnon. The following street committee was appointed: Councillors McNeil and Compton, west; Councillors Lefurgey and Campbell, centre; Councillors Baker and Goss, east. Council adjourned until next monthly meeting.

EASTER IN THE CHURCHES.

The Easter services in the various churches yesterday were well attended. Able and appropriate sermons were preached, and the decorations and music were in keeping with the joyous occasion. The services in St. Dunstan's Cathedral were solemnized with all the grandeur of the Roman Catholic ritual. The High Altar was beautifully decorated with flowers and ablaze with lighted tapers. Rev. I. R. A. Macdonald celebrated High Mass at ten o'clock, with Fathers Arsenault and Hogan as deacon and subdeacon. A sermon appropriate to the occasion was preached by Rev. D. B. Reil. The choir, under the direction of Mr. Barret, rendered Haydn's last Mass in B flat in an excellent manner. The music, in the opinion of many present, was superior to anything ever before heard in the Cathedral. The choir was assisted by an efficient orchestra consisting of first violin, second violin, flute, first and second cornets, clarinet and double bass, played respectively by Miss May Macdonald and Messrs V. Darven, J. Blake, J. Gallant, R. Johnson and G. A. Sharpe. The orchestra was assisted at the evening service by the music was exceptionally good, especially the Laudate and Tantum Ergo, sung by Mrs. Byrne. The services at St. Peter's were also well attended. The musical portion of the service was especially well rendered. The choir, besides the special chants used on such occasions, gave a very pretty anthem, the solos in which were well sung by Mr. Barret and Mr. Fred Hayward. The sermon was delivered by Rev. W. Hamlyn. The services at St. Peter's Cathedral were bright and in keeping with the occasion, and the attendance at each was large. The altar decorations were very beautiful, and the music excellent. Rev. Mr. Simpson preached at both morning and evening services. At the First Methodist Church there were also large congregations at the different services. The choir, under the direction of Mr. Earle, rendered excellent music. The anthems at the morning service were "O death where is thy sting," and "Now on the first day of the week." The organ selections were from Handel's Messiah. At the evening service the anthems were "Christ our Passover," "Hear Me O Lord," and "How Long With Thou forget Me, O Lord," and the organ selections consisted of a grand processional march and andante by Schumann and march by Dubouix. Rev. Mr. Campbell was the preacher. There was a large congregation at each service in the Second Methodist Church, and the sermon by Rev. Mr. Palmer was appropriate to the occasion. The pulpit was nicely decorated with flowers. The Easter music at St. John the Baptist Church, Miscouche, was on an elaborate scale. The regular choir of thirty voices was much augmented, and a splendid full orchestra was added, which certainly lent new grandeur to an otherwise grand choral programme.

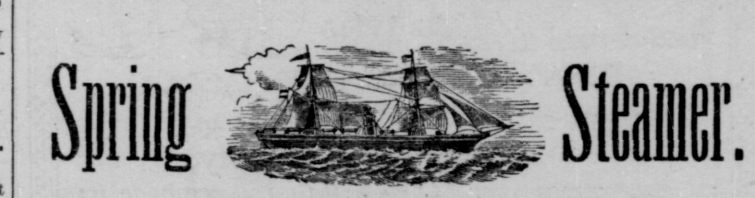
