TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Queen's Speech.

LONDON, Aug. 12. The Marquis of Salisbury has drafted the Queen's Speech closing the present session of Parliament. His aim is to make the speech a manifesto in favor of the Conservatives. The Speech will refer to the quietude of Ireland without coercion; the successful issue of the Egyptian loan, the revival of peaceful relations with other nations, the friendly alliance with foreign powers, and the activity of legislation since the Conservatives came into power, as a matter of national congratulation.

The Power of the Quebec Government. LONDON, Aug. 12. In the House of Commons last night the Colonial Secretary, in answer to a question by Mr. Broadhurst, said the Quebec Legislature had the power to pass a bill enacting that crucifixes be placed in the courts of justice in that province, and to enforce its operation without the approval of England.

Mrs Jeffries Again. LONDON, Aug. 12. The Social Purity Society are demanding a new trial for the purpose of learning the names of the politicians and noblemen who frequented her house.

A French woman, who was formerly mistress for Sir Charles Dilke, is cited for the plaintiff in the Crawford divorce suit.

Railway Accident. OTTAWA, Aug. 12. A Grand Trunk train yesterday fell through the bridge on the old Welland Canal. The engineer was killed at his post, and two train hands also lost their lives by the accident.

A Mining Accident. WILKESBARRE, PA., Aug. 12. A serious accident occurred at Mocan yesterday. A fire in the mine deprived the operatives of air. Twelve dead bodies have so far been recovered.

A Horrible Bull Fight. LONDON, Aug. 12. A horrible bull fight took place at Nima on Sunday last, resulting in the butchery of horses and bulls and serious injury to the torreador.

Christian Massacre. PARIS, Aug. 12. Further advices from Tonquin state that over 10,000 Christians have been massacred in the Provinces of Biendeh and Phuyin.

Cholera in Spain. MADRID, Aug. 12. There were 3,510 new cases of cholera, and 1,343 deaths reported throughout Spain yesterday.

Death of the Archbishop of Seville. MADRID, Aug. 12. The Archbishop of Seville died of cholera yesterday.

Death of a Poet. LONDON, Aug. 12. Lord Houghton, Poet and Critic, is dead.

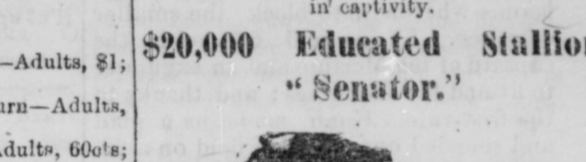
