### TRANSFERRED

Premier David Ben-Gurion in a broadcast to the nation also accused those powers "which supply aggressive arms to Egypt and deny defensive arms to Israel of preparing a war of annihilation against Israel. France has been making the Mysteres for NATO forces under U.S. offshore procurement orders. Washington is understood to have approved their diversion from NATO but to have refused to give official approval to their delivery to Israel, leaving that responsibility to the French.

The informant who told of arrival of the Mysteres said Israel still needs more defensive power to meet the threat of the 40 Soviet Iluyshin bombers received by Egypt in her arms deal with Czechoslovakia. Israel has asked Britain for 14 Centurion tanks, he disclosed. "If we don't get these weapons, then of course we will fight without them," he added. "But if we don't get the weapons, then there certainly will be war when the Arabs are ready."

The informant asserted the Egyptians have massed most of their military strength in the Sinai peninsula on the southwestern frontiers of Palestine. He estimated the total frontline strength of the Egyptian army at the moment at 150,000 troops.

Syria has about 40,000 frontline troops and the Arab states all together could put about 280,000 men into the field against Israel's army of 200,000, he estimated.

The informant said it was the prevailing opinion among Israeli leaders that direct Western intervention in Israel was not feasible. He added that in Israel's opinion the only way to make the Arabs unsure they could win and thus avoid war would be to provide more arms for Israeli self-defence.

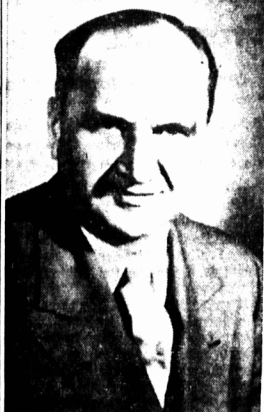

### LOYD JENKINS NOTED EDITOR

Lloyd Jenkins, son of the late R. Harold Jenkins - a former mayor of Charlottetown and M.P. for Queens - is winning new laurels in his capacity as editor of Ford of Canada's prize-winning "Ford Graphic" magazine for employees. He was recently appointed a judge for the 1955 International Council of Industrial Editors Awards Program to take place in New Haven, Connecticut, from May 24.

The panel of judges will appraise some 850 entries and the winners in the different categories will receive their awards at the I.C.I.E. conference in Los Angeles in June. "Ford Graphic", which Mr. Jenkins has edited for the past three years for the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, Toronto, has won a total of eight Canadian and international awards since the publication was founded in 1947.

A graduate of McGill University with a Master of Arts degree, Mr. Jenkins is a former reporter and news editor. He was associated with news papers in Charlottetown, Ottawa and Edmonton. He served five years with the R.C.A.F. during World War 2. Returning to the service in 1950 with the rank of Squadron Leader, he was seconded to the R.C.A.F. Association as executive assistant, from which position he came to Ford of Canada.

### Mustang Fighter Pilot Killed

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—A Mustang fighter plane crashed within a minute after take-off Sunday from London airport, killing its RCAF auxiliary pilot.

Ft. Lt. Gray Goodeve, 34, of London, a member of the City of London 420 Squadron, was killed as he tried to bank onto an airfield strip but bounced into a farmer's field.

Goodeve's propeller-driven plane had just cleared the runway when he radioed that he had to make an emergency landing. As he banked to return, his engine apparently failed. The plane tore into a farmer's field. Parts of the aircraft were scattered over an area of 200 yards.

### Navy League Holds Meeting

Charles P. MacKenzie was elected vice-president for Charlottetown at a meeting of the P.E.I. Division of the Navy League of Canada Saturday. The meeting was held in the wardroom of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte, President Charles Hogan, presiding.

It was decided to send the secretary-treasurer, Gordon Kelly of Summerside, as a delegate to the semi-annual meeting to be held in Halifax the 26, 28 and 29th of April. The president and possibly other members will also attend. Arrangements were made to add to the executive representatives of the sponsoring bodies of Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps, the Naval Officers' Association for R.C.S.C. C. Kent and the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion for the Summerside corps.

Annual inspection of the two corps will be Summerside May 14 and Charlottetown May 15. The inspecting officer will be Rear Admiral Roger Bidwell.

A committee was appointed to make arrangements for simultaneous drives for funds in Charlottetown and Summerside.

The beavers were flown from Canada as a gift from Granby, Que., for the wedding of Rainier and Grace Kelly.

Bruchesi, who was to present them to the prince, said earlier Saturday he couldn't trace them—they seemed to have gone astray between Nice and Monaco.

Later, however, he announced they had been delivered. Another problem came up when it was discovered that neither Bruchesi, writer of many books on Canada, nor Prince Rainier, a keen zoologist, nor the zoo curator knows the feeding habits of beavers.

"I think it is fish," Bruchesi said. He was inquiring to make sure.
