A. O. U. W.
Lodges to be Established and Next Session Held Here.
The Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of the Province of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces has just concluded its seventh annual session which was held at Halifax, N. S., and have honored Charlottetown by deciding to hold its next session here. Some of the Grand Lodge officers spent Saturday and Sunday in Charlottetown and were delighted with its surroundings and the hospitality extended to them by our citizens. They look forward with pleasure to the next convention, and furthermore will encourage their friends to accompany them on that occasion. Among those who visited the city were Dr. J. Z. Frigante, who was accompanied by his wife and sister, Captain G. Lefebvre, Grand Receiver, R. Lynch of the executive committee, and J. O. Huard.
At present there are no Lodges of this society in Charlottetown, but it is the intention of the Grand Lodge officers to send organizers to the Island who will place its merits before our citizens with a view to establishing several lodges here before its next session.
The order was instituted in Meadville, Pennsylvania, on the 27th of October, 1868, with a membership of thirteen, and it has today a membership of four hundred and eight thousand. It has expended upwards of one hundred millions of dollars in beneficiaries to date; last year alone it disbursed eight million seven hundred thousand dollars for this great cause.
It is a fraternal, charitable, beneficial and benevolent society, organized for the promotion of the welfare (social and fraternal) of its members and the protection of those dependent upon them. This great order enrolls under its banner members in all spheres of life. It enforces no creed in religion nor code in politics; its motto is, "Charity, Hope and Protection."

GATHERING OF THE CLANS.
Result of the Different Events on Saturday.
The Caledonian games held in Souris Saturday were a success in the matter of attendance at least. Souris village was deserted, and when the games began at two o'clock an immense crowd of spectators filled the stand and grounds. On the oval inside the track a special stand had been erected on which were seated Governor McIntyre and party, Premier and Mrs. Farquharson, A. McDonald, Esq., of Dalvey, Col. Orr and others. The grand stand across the track, without covering of any description and with the broiling sun fairly scorching the occupants was filled to overflowing, while on the oval—and even on the track—a large number, who could not gain admission to the stand, took up positions. The track was not one that would delight an athlete's heart, and there is one thing of which Souris cannot boast—its athletic grounds. Below is a summary of the events:

In the race Doyle fell on the back stretch but mounted his wheel again and pluckily finished.

President McPhee's medal awarded to the best all round professional athlete was won by D. J. Macdonald, city, who placed 18 point to his credit.
Chief J. A. McLaren's Prize awarded to the best all round professional athlete who had never before taken a prize was won by J. McGee, St. Mary's Road, who scored 10 points in the three novice events.
To say that the track was rough is to put it very mildly; for Saturday it consisted of miniature mountains and valleys which meant grief to wheels of bicyclists and ankles of sprinters and jumpers. But notwithstanding this drawback the competition was keen and interesting. D. J. Macdonald again carried off President McPhee's medal awarded to the best all round professional athlete. He won three first and a second. Chief McLaren's prize awarded to the best novice athlete (professional) went to J. McGee, of St. Mary's Road, who won two firsts. The excellent drill of the Highland Brigade under Major Stewart was a feature of the day's entertainment and called forth rounds of applause from the spectators.
Mr. D. O'M. R. dlin, of Charlottetown, and Mr. McQuaid, of Souris, representatives of the Irish Society, paraded with the clansmen, and the thistle and shamrock entwined their branches.
The spirited playing of the 82nd Band and of Piper Peter Ferguson was much appreciated. Mr. Ferguson played several selections on the way to Souris.

STRUCK BY THE LIGHTNING
Damage Reported After Yesterday's Storm.
SEVERAL HOUSES STUCK AND BARN DESTROYED.
Two Women Rendered Unconscious at Souris.
A severe storm of thunder and lightning, accompanied by a heavy down-pour of rain passed over this province last evening. There was no damage by the lightning in the city that we have heard of, but the rain got into several cellars.
A house on the Curdigan Road, owned by a man named Daniel McLean, was struck by the electric current and burned down.
The house of Dr. McLellan, at Souris, was also struck, and badly damaged about the roof. The servant girl was rendered insensible and remained in that condition until early this morning.
Mrs. Pyke's house at Souris also suffered, the lightning entering through the roof and passing down through the parlor. Mrs. Pyke was struck and rendered insensible for quite a while. To-day she is reported "all right again."
Two barns east of Souris were struck by the lightning and destroyed.
The electrical storm which passed over this province yesterday evening was unusually heavy at Kingston. A large barn belonging to Mr. Robert Willis, in which was stored 25 tons of hay and almost all the farming implements, was struck by lightning and in a short time was reduced to ashes. There is some insurance. Had it not been for the promptitude with which the neighbors rushed to the scene of the fire, all of the buildings would have been burned. Mr. Willis wishes to extend his gratitude to all who assisted in preventing the spread of the fire to the adjoining buildings.
The Roman Catholic Church at Hope River was struck by lightning and ten feet of the spire fell to the ground. A slight fire which started was quickly put out. The Hope River Hall was also shattered.
Hon. R. B. Reid's store at Alberton was struck but no considerable damage resulted.
Two barns were struck by lightning at Ross's Corner. One owned by a Mr. Ross in which four horses and a pig were killed. The other barn was owned by Mr. L. U. Eowler. We have not heard the extent of the damage.
A barn at Kingston owned by Mr. Willis was destroyed during the storm.

THE WHELAN DEMONSTRATION.
Parade of Societies—Big Time on the Grounds.
The Whelan Demonstration on the grounds of the Charlottetown Amateur Athletic Association to-day is largely attended. Besides a great number from Charlottetown, other sections of the Province are well represented. All classes and creeds are uniting to do honor to the man who has done much for the Island province.
Besides the two Irish Societies of Charlottetown the Emerald Branch of the Benevolent Irish Socie y and the Caledonian Club of Charlottetown participated in the procession which took place this forenoon, and a splendid appearance was presented.
There were several bands of music and pipers in the procession, which went over the route outlined in Saturday's paper.
