The Myrtle Navy is made three plugs to the pound, and each plug is carefully weighed.

He was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day and the case was adjourned until to-morrow for further evidence.

Mrs. Walker, though not through the breast and arm, picked up her child and ran indoors, where she died. Hermine and his son were captured and jailed. Next morning a gang of masked men broke the prisoners out and hanged them to the trees. A dispute about land was the cause of crime.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT HOUSE IN SUPPLY.

OTTAWA, April 6. House met at three o'clock. Several petitions in favor of excluding light wines and beer from the operations of the Scott Act were presented. Sir Hector moved that Thursdays be taken for Government days. Mitchell protested that the Government had occupied all the members' days with the debate on the Riel resolutions, and ought not, at such an early stage, to take a third day in the week. Blake thought the Government ought not to take the coming Thursday. Davies thought the House ought to sit on Saturdays. Sir Hector said the Government had to look after departmental work and see to matters throughout the country, and wanted Saturday for that purpose. He would however agree to take Thursday of next week and thereafter. The resolution, so amended, passed. Several bills were read a second time and passed through committee. The House then went into committee of supply, and passed several items in the vote on charges of management.

After recess, the items of Governor-General's secretary's office, Department of Justice, Penitentiaries, Branch Militia, Secretary of State and Secretary of the Interior were passed in committee of supply. There was considerable debate on the Interior items, as to the land system.

BRITISH AFFAIRS MINISTERIAL DISSENSIONS.

LONDON, April 6. The Cabinet met to-day at noon, and remained in session until two o'clock. Gladstone laid before the Ministers his Irish Home Rule scheme. It is reported that the discussion that followed, resulted in continuing the ministerial opposition to certain features of the Premier's proposals. Earl Kimberley, Childers, Sir Wm Vernon Harcourt and Mandella are, it is said, as much opposed as ever to that feature which surrenders control of the Customs of Ireland.

LATER. The Cabinet feud has temporarily abated. Gladstone modifies his proposals regarding customs control, by giving the English Parliament a right to veto all fiscal enactments of Ireland, providing an Imperial receiver shall collect customs and excise, making Imperial claims a first charge on the revenues. The malcontents consequently withhold their resignations. Gladstone is thoroughly supported in all his proposals by Granville, Rosebery, the Marquis of Ripon and Mr. Campbell Bannerman. Gladstone is in robust health and good voice, and is confident of success. It is reported that Lord Salisbury has persuaded Lord Hartington to move that the House refuse to consider Gladstone's bill.

A Warlike Speech

ATHENS, April 6. The Minister of War has returned from a tour of inspection of frontier defences. He expressed his delight to various commanders at the efficiency of the works. Before leaving Arta he requested the officers to inform the men that they were destined to uphold the honor of Greece on the field of battle and would not return to their homes until that honor was satisfied. Great preparations are being made to celebrate the anniversary of Greek independence to-morrow.

A Devastating Gale

TORONTO, April 6. A terrific gale, accompanied by a heavy fall of snow, has been playing sad havoc throughout Ontario to-day. In Guelph the roof of the Bell organ factory was blown off, and the engineer and fireman were seriously injured if not fatally. Several other employees were injured. In Toronto several buildings were damaged and a number of persons injured. In Hamilton and all along the beach thousands of dollars worth of property were destroyed.

Looks Dark for Gould.

St. LOUIS, April 6. The committee of the Knights of Labor, who have been in session most of the day, have finished an address to the workmen of the world. It is chiefly a strong denunciation of Jay Gould, and calls upon workmen of the world to assist in his overthrow as their only salvation.

Destructive Flames

NAPANEE, Ont., April 6. A destructive fire raged here last night and this morning. A number of business establishments and several private dwellings were destroyed. Total loss is estimated at \$110,000.

LONDON, April 6. Right Rev. Harvey Goodwin, D. D., Bishop of Carlisle, England, sails for New York on the 14th inst.

Yet Another.

SHELburne, Ont., April 6. Early yesterday morning the Royal Block was destroyed by fire. Total loss is estimated at \$52,000.

And Still They Come.

BELLEVILLE, Ont., April 6. The Cronk Block was destroyed by fire this morning. Loss about \$40,000.

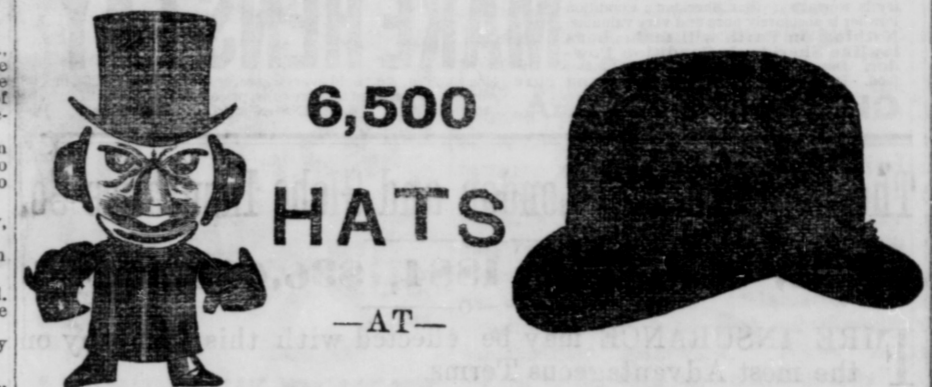

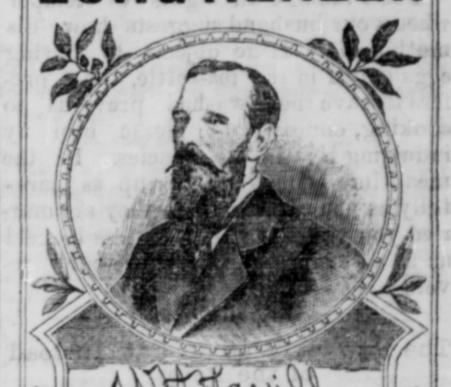
