REV. FATHER RABEKE, of the Roman Catholic Order, who has been on the Island several weeks recovering his health, preached a eloquent and instructive sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday. AT a public meeting in Moncton, about 200 electors being present, a resolution recommending that the council appoint an inspector or other officer to enforce the Scott Act was put and carried by a unanimous vote.

REV. FATHER MEUNIER, who has been appointed to succeed Rev. Father Hebert in the parochial charge of the Magdalen Islands, arrived in this city on Friday evening and left for the Magdalens via Souris next day. He officiated in the Catholic Church at East Point yesterday. REV. FATHERS ALLAN MACDONALD, Gregory Macdonald and A. E. Burke, who accompany His Lordship Bishop McIntyre and party, who are on a trip over the C. E. R., as far as Montreal, have arrived home—the two first named on Friday and the latter on Saturday evening.

AT the Sundry Magistrate's Court this forenoon a drunk and disorderly was fined \$30 or 30 days; two drunks were disposed of for \$1 and \$4 each, and the trial of a youth who yesterday was one of a gang that amused themselves beating a countryman, was adjourned for one week. TWO of the large plate glass panes in the window of Mr. C. P. Fletcher's Music Store, on Queen Street, were broken either late on Saturday night or early yesterday morning. Mr. Fletcher's windows are broken on an average about once every month, and it is about time some of the offenders were brought to justice.

THE Kentville, N. B. Chronicle is responsible for the statement that a strange animal, about the size of a cat 3 months old, striped like a leopard, some eight feet long and which makes a dreadful noise somewhat resembling the noise of a train, has been seen in the woods near that place recently. Is Kentville a Scott Act town? (Mr. THOS. BROWN, an old man of over 70 years of age, living at Torbrook, N. S., has sheared this year 600 sheep in good order. Several of the farmers for whom he sheared this year he worked for in the same capacity 30, 40, and 50 years ago. He himself intended shearing 80 years ago many times then he has sheared no less than 90,710 sheep.

WE regret to learn that a young man named O'Neill, son of Mr. John O'Neill, formerly of this city but now of Boston, was the victim of a sad and, it is thought, fatal accident at Vernon River, on Friday evening last. FROM a despatch received on Saturday evening, by Mrs. Capt. Power, of this city, from her husband, who is at present at North Sydney, C. B., we learn that the schooner Annie Duncan foundered at sea, but that fortunately the crew were saved. The Annie Duncan was about 75 tons register, and was owned jointly by Capt. Power and Mr. David Webster. On Monday Mr. Power and Mr. Webster were on board, and the vessel was bound for the Comox and the cargo of her hold received on Saturday evening, was the first heard of her since she left a crew of three men besides the Captain. She was not injured. Capt. Power is expected home on Wednesday next.

THE TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Desolation in Newfoundland. NEW YORK, Sept. 12. A Halifax special says that the widespread desolation in Newfoundland is assuming an acute form. Grim starvation is staring upwards of one hundred and forty thousand helpless and almost hopeless men, women and children in the face. The statement is not exaggerated. But it is the plain English of existing facts. The herring catch is a failure. The shore fishery almost equals the Labrador fishery in the completeness of its failure. Of the 90,000 people dependent upon that branch for an existence, less than 20,000 have secured enough to carry them through the winter.

The Mayflower Wins. NEW YORK, Sept. 12. Yesterday's race between the English cutter Galataea and the American schooner Mayflower, for the America's cup, resulted in a glorious victory for the latter. While the Mayflower had only 8 min. 20 sec. to spare at the finish, she beat the Galataea on every point of sailing. The course was 20 miles to leeward and returning to the lightship.

Sheehan Arrested. MONTREAL, Sept. 12. Michael J. Sheehan, dealer in ready-made clothing, Yarmouth, N. S., was arrested at Bonaventure Depot, on his arrival there yesterday, on a writ of capias. It appears that he became indebted to Montreal firms to the amount of \$30,000 and assigned covering his assets by preferential creditors among them being his father.

The Recent Seizures. TORONTO, Sept. 12. A Washington despatch says that the Treasury officials state that the three British flag vessels recently arrested in Alaska waters will be released at San Francisco. This shows that the American Government, while making well out of the seal monopoly, feels weak over the seizures.

Another Seizure. HALIFAX, Sept. 12. Last night the American schooner Moro Castle, lying at Port Mulgrave, was seized by Collector Bourinot, of Hawkesbury. The charge against her is a violation of the Customs laws.

Railway Accident—Two Men Killed. TORONTO, Sept. 12. An accident occurred on the Canada Pacific Railway near Rat Portage yesterday, by which two men were killed. Several of the cars were badly wrecked.

Opened to the Public. TORONTO, Sept. 12. The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. have now perfected their telegraph arrangements and their entire lines will be opened to the public on Monday.

Russians on the Move. LONDON, Sept. 12. The Cologne Gazette says that twenty Russian officers are going to Bulgaria to occupy the highest military positions.
