THE P. W. College Debating Club had a very interesting meeting yesterday afternoon. A good programme was carried out, consisting of readings, recitations, songs and essays. It was decided to have a mock trial next Friday, and to discuss a week later the subject of capital punishment.

WHEN the lighthouse and fog signal at Cape Race, Nfld., passes into the hands of the Dominion Government on July 1st, all light dues will be abolished. The Imperial Government, by whom the lighthouse is now controlled, has a surplus of \$90,000 from the collection of the years past, and this will be handed over to the Dominion authorities.

A MARRIED lady, of Richmond, Ohio, on Sunday morning, 17th inst., gave birth to a fine of nature. The child had one head, two clearly defined bodies, four arms and four legs. The bodies were joined together at the shoulders, the backs being squarely against each other. One body was female while the other was male. The freak lived about thirty minutes, and made its presence known by faint wails. The father and mother are hearty, and perfectly formed people.

AT Montreal, on the afternoon of the 25th inst., while the prisoners were being removed from the police van at the jail, one of them, George Jarvis, bolted. Constable Quinn started in pursuit and called upon Jarvis to stop. This Jarvis did not do, and Quinn fired at him, the bullet knocking the heel off one of his boots. Jarvis took refuge in a hay loft, and in prodding for him with a pitchfork Quinn stuck it into his body twice, but not seriously injuring him. The last prod made him come out of his hiding place, and he was taken back to jail.

THIS is the way a Western paper gives the news:—"In the Sollerino mine, Nevada, Col., a loose rock knocked A. Warren out of the bucket. A piece of jawbone was found at the 1200 foot level, and a piece of skull and a coat at the 1300 foot level. This comprised his recoverable effects."

JACOB CHRISTMAN, a young German, of Wabash, Ind., met with a horrible accident on the 22nd, which will result in his death. He and his brother Henry were hauling logs from the woods on bobbeds. When the sleds were partially loaded, and while skidding a log, it slipped, rolled back and caught Jacob and bore him to the ground, wedging his legs beneath the sleds and the log upon his hips.

He appealed piteously to Henry for assistance. After vainly endeavoring to move the log over the legs of the prostrate man, Henry rolled it across his abdomen, breast and head, crushing his countenance beyond recognition, smashing the frontal bones, and inflicting injuries which will result fatally. In explanation he stated that he was afraid to leave Jacob with the log upon him, and knew of no other course to pursue.

Color Works Burned.

TORONTO, Jan. 29. The lead and color works of McNally & Percy were totally destroyed by fire this afternoon. Brown, foreman, and Aikenhead, bookkeeper, were both seriously injured. Loss \$22,000, insurance \$9,600.

Found Guilty.

TORONTO, Jan. 29. Dr. Andrews was tried at the Criminal Assizes to-day for procuring abortion upon Jenny Leslie, and found guilty. Two points were reserved, and sentences will not be pronounced till these are disposed of.

Fatal Railway Collision.

SANDUSKY, Ohio, Jan. 29. The Chicago express on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad ran into the rear of a freight train a mile out of Chicago Junction this morning. The engineer and fireman of the express train and conductor of the freight train were killed.

The Sarnia.

LONDON, Jan. 29. The Sarnia was spoken by the steamer England, at Liverpool from New York, seventy miles west of Fastnet. She declined assistance. Tugs have been despatched to render any necessary aid.

Bulgaria and Turkey.

LONDON, Jan. 29. The agreement between Bulgaria and Turkey provides that in case they are needed Bulgaria will contribute 80,000 troops to the Turkish army.

Uniforms Wanted.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 29. An order has been received here for the manufacture of 40,000 uniforms for the Greek army.

Not Confirmed.

LONDON, Jan. 29. Reports of the resignation of the Greek Ministry have not been confirmed.

Parliamentary News.

LONDON, Jan. 29. The Telegraph says the parliamentary supporters of Parnell state he will not accept a cabinet office.

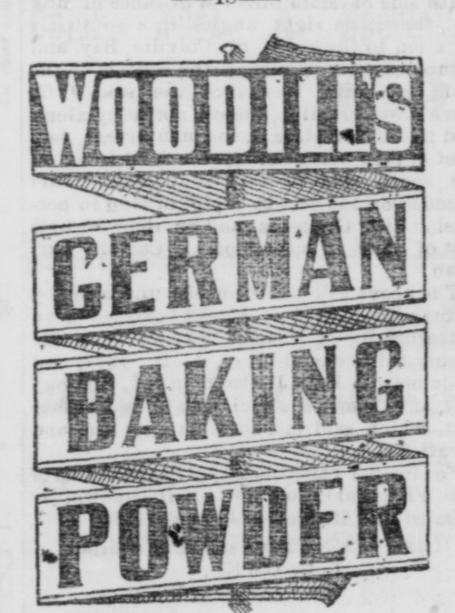
The Queen has accepted the resignation of Lord Salisbury and his cabinet. Lord Salisbury returned to London this evening from Osborne.
