A FULL attendance is requested at St. Matthew's Temperance Society this evening, at 8 o'clock. THERE is an immense boom in hall stoves and house-banking as a result of the present cold snap. V.) officiate at Lot 48 on Sabbath first, the 14th inst., at 11 o'clock a. m., and at Birch Hill at 2.30 p. m. Mr. D. F. MAXWELL, C. E., St. John, N. B., and Mr. J. J. Newman, an American capitalist, are in the city looking up water-works matters. THE Supreme Court adjourned yesterday until to-morrow, when the continuation of the argument for the writ of certiorari in the Scott Act cases will be heard. His GRACE, the Most Reverend C. O'Brien, Archbishop of Halifax, arrived here by the Pictou boat yesterday evening. His Grace remains on the Island some days. THE new C. P. R. bridge across the St. Lawrence at Lachine has been completed. The great Victoria bridge took about five years to construct; this new rival only six months. WE regret to learn that some 600 sheep, out of the 855 shipped by Messrs. Blake Bros. on the steamer Clifton were lost during the passage to London. They were not insured. The loss is estimated at about \$4,000. ST. ANDREW'S DINNER.—This annual festival will be celebrated under the auspices of the Caledonian Club of P. E. Island, at the Revere House, Charlottetown, on Tuesday evening, the 30th day of November, instant. Tickets, one dollar each. JOHN McVARIISH, said to be a P. E. Islander, was found drowned at the New England wharf, Gloucester, Mass., on Tuesday last. McVarish, who had been missing for several days, was about 35 years of age and a fisherman by occupation. A MONTREAL doctor who had an account with a job printer agreed to take his pay in work. After he had all the printing done he needed there still remained a balance, and as his wife was very sick he decided to have some blank funeral notices struck off with her name on them. He locked them in his desk, his wife got well and found them, and now she talks of getting a divorce. THE meeting of the L. & S. Association held last night in J. D. McLeod's Hall, was attended by a large number. It was agreed to meet again on Monday next in the parlour of the Y. M. C. A., and in the meantime members are solicited to join the Association, fee 50 cents. The first lecture of the course will be delivered by Mr. Bain about the middle of this month. His subject will be "Darwinism," of which further notice will be given in season. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Scott Act Perjury Trials. MONROE, Nov. 8. The third perjury case arising out of the Scott Act prosecutions, was heard before sitting Magistrate Smith this evening. George P. Thomas, the defending lawyer in the Scott Act cases, was arrested at the instance of David Grant, prosecuting attorney for the temperance people. The perjury was alleged to have been committed at the trial of Crossman, the Scott Act informer. A number of witnesses were examined on both sides, and the court adjourned at a late hour. The magistrate is to give his decision to-morrow.

Fire at Calgary. CALGARY, N. W. T., Nov. 8. Fire broke out about five o'clock yesterday morning in a provision store, and spread with frightful rapidity. It was at one time feared that the whole town would be burned down. Col. Herchimer sent down nearly his whole force of mounted police, and they did heroic service in staying the fire. The destitute are being properly cared for, the police tents having been erected for their shelter. The total losses will foot up over \$100,000, with about \$24,000 insurance.

The Ring. BALTIMORE, Nov. 8. About 3,000 persons attended the Kilrain-Heard sparring match this afternoon. In the first round Kilrain landed Heard squarely on his back in a corner, where he lay bleeding from the mouth and nose, when the police stopped the fight. Kilrain was not touched, while Heard received a cut on his lip and another on his nose. The referee decided the fight off, because of police interference.

Commercial Difficulties. MONTREAL, Nov. 8. The direct liabilities of Geo. Barry, leather merchant are estimated at \$50,000. The Bank of Montreal is interested about \$30,000. N. E. Labbe has entered an action against La Banque Nationale for \$50,000 damages in connexion with the prosecution against him by the Bank for conspiracy and which fell through.

The Eastern Difficulty. SOFIA, Nov. 8. Gen. Kaulbars has refused to communicate to Russia the note of the Bulgarian Government, asking the powers to name a candidate to the throne, because Bulgaria knows that Russia has declared the decision of the Sobranje to be illegal. The election of a prince will only occupy one sitting of the Sobranje.

Fire at Sea. ST. PIERRE, MIQ., Nov. 8. A large bark on fire was sighted Monday noon about nine miles southwest of St. Pierre, drifting east. The tug Progress has been out and returned for towing gear. She reports the hull ablaze, timber laden, name obliterated except Swansea. No signs of the crew.

Fatal Railway Collision. WINNIPEG, Nov. 8. A collision occurred near Rogers' Pass, B. C., between a passenger and a work train. The latter was loaded with contract men, two of whom were killed and four wounded.

Royal Marriage. BERLIN, Nov. 8. The nuptials of Princess Elizabeth, of Saxe Weimar, and the Duke of Mecklenburg, have taken place at the Palace Chapel at Weimar.

Smallpox. HALIFAX, Nov. 8. Advice from Kingston, Jamaica, say there has been five hundred cases of smallpox in that city up to the end of August.

All Quiet. CHICAGO, Nov. 8. All was perfectly quiet about the stock yards at 11.30 to-night.

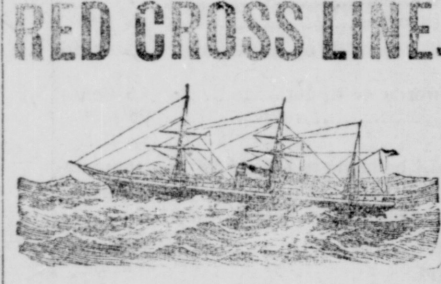
