Mr. Brecken

THE tone of the debate as reported in Hansard, as well as the notable words above quoted, would certainly lead any unprejudiced mind to the conclusion that Mr. McKenzie "opposed the grant" for Cape Traverse Railway. But Mr. Brecken says that the debate was not fully reported in Hansard, and that Mr. McKenzie said explicitly, in effect, that he was "opposed to the grant" on the ground that everything had already been done that could be done towards fulfilling the Terms of Union with Prince Edward Island. The statement of Mr. Brecken who was present, and heard the words, will certainly be accepted before the declaration of the Patriot whose editor was not present. The Patriot has a strong motive in evading the force of the words used by Mr. McKenzie, for they mean overwhelming disaster in this Island, to the Party of which, (so far as public works and railways are concerned,) Mr. McKenzie is the head, and it is the tail.

The National Policy and Prince Edward Island.

THE best evidence of the strength of the position taken by THE EXAMINER, respecting the National Policy and its effects upon this Province, is afforded by the persistency of the Grit organs in misrepresenting it.

Thus, the Summerside Journal says:—"After three years' trial of the N. P., all THE EXAMINER can say for it is that it has not injured this Province."

Now, THE EXAMINER said nothing of the kind.

What THE EXAMINER said was this:—"If the whole country respied an advantage from it, we should not complain unless it positively injures us;—but rather try to find out how we, also, may reap some advantage. It will not be difficult to prove that the National Policy has not injured P. E. Island; and we think it may be shown the Island has obtained under it, at least some positive gain."

Then we went on and proved conclusively that the National Policy had not only not injured the Island, but that under it we had made and obtained large positive gains, which, under one-sided Free Trade, we could not possibly have made or obtained.

Cape Traverse Railway.

THE attempt of the Patriot to make political capital out of a letter written by E. J. Hodgson, Esq., is very ridiculous.

Mr. Hodgson wrote to the Government submitting "reasons why the railway should not be built from Cape Traverse to County Line, but from Sea Cow Point to Summerside."

The Government rejected Mr. Hodgson's reasons and adopted the reasons of J. S. Carvell, Frederick de St. Croix Brecken, A. C. McDonald, E. B. Mutart, Edward Hackett and Donald Montgomery—the constitutional representatives of the Island. And the Patriot foams over "wire-pulling and back stairs influence."

From the fact that the Government paid no attention whatever to Mr. Hodgson's reasons, the elaborate letter of Messrs. Arthur Irving, John Hughes and others, showing that Mr. Hodgson is all wrong about the matter, seems to have been quite unnecessary. We have not space today for the insertion of the letter; but, though the question has been disposed of to our satisfaction and to the satisfaction, we should hope, of Arthur Irving, Finlay

McFadyen, Isaac Clarke, Patrick Deagan, John F. Aineets, Martin Lavers and John Hughes, whose names were attached to it, we shall endeavor to insert it as per request.

We may add that, though we disagree with Mr. Hodgson, we think that Mr. Hodgson had a perfect right to write the letter, that a question so important deserved to be regarded by the Government from every point of view, and that the Government did perfectly right in placing the letter in the return.

The fact that the letter is so published, shows clearly the utter falsity of the Patriots' mean insinuation that there was some underhand work about the matter. That the unduly voluminous resolutions passed at a meeting held in Cape Traverse were not published in the return, is no matter for either surprise or indignation. The object of the meeting has been fairly carried out by the Government. The resolutions adopted by the Charlottetown meeting were not published in the return. It is surprising that in this "joint letter" no mention whatever is made of the other correspondence contained in the return. The memorial of the Island's representatives was well worthy of some attention; and the writers of the joint letter ought, in fairness, to have given us the benefit of their opinions upon it. But, perhaps the most sensible among them did not see the whole of the "return."

Prince of Wales College and Normal School.

GREATER interest than ever seems to be centered in Prince of Wales College and Normal School. So large was the number of persons present at the examination today that the room was overcrowded and many could not obtain admittance; and, indeed, the success of "the amalgamated Institution" is so decided that a new or enlarged College Building is required for the accommodation of the pupils. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor occupied the chair, and there were present to witness the exercises, a fair representation of the dignitaries of Church and State, besides many ladies and gentlemen in private life.

Presbyterian Church in Canada.

THE Synod of the Maritime Provinces, which includes New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Cape Breton, and Newfoundland, will meet (D. V.) in St. James' Church here, on the evening of Tuesday next, at 7.20 o'clock.

The opening sermon will be preached by the Rev. Dr. Pollock, Professor of Church History in the Presbyterian College, Halifax, the retiring Moderator. After the reading of the Rolls of Presbyteries, and the making up of the Roll for the year will be elected, committees struck for the work of the session, and arrangements made as to hours and order of business.

Members of the several Presbyterian congregations in the city, and the public generally, are invited to attend the proceedings of the Synod. The afternoon and evening meetings are expected to possess more general interest; the morning diets will be occupied, in a measure, with matters of a routine character. Several committees will meet in the Church on Tuesday, prior to the formal opening of the Court.

To Ship Masters.

We give the following extract from note of Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries to E. L. Lydiard, dated 11th December, 1881, for the benefit of Ship Masters:—"I beg to inform you that by Section 279 of the Merchant Shipping Act Imperial registered vessels (except passenger ships) on arrival at a port in a Colony, and remaining therein forty-eight hours, are required within forty-eight hours of arrival, to deposit the agreement with the crew, and also all indentures and assignments of apprenticeships.

By the Canadian Seaman's Act, 1873, the master of the vessel is required to show his articles to Shipping Master in order that the latter may be enabled to grant his certificate to the Collector of Customs that the requirements of the law have been complied with, in order to authorize the latter official to grant a clearance. In neither case, Imperial or Canadian, is there any provision for the charging of a fee for the certificate. Masters of Canadian registered vessels are not obliged to deposit articles, but show them when clearing for a foreign port and obtain certificate as above.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Hon. Mr. Costigan in Toronto.

CAMPAIGN NEWS!

OTTAWA, May 24.

The Hon. Mr. Costigan, Minister of Inland Revenue, addressed an immense meeting in Toronto, last night; and at the conclusion of a most telling and eloquent speech, received a cordial vote of thanks.

His appointment gives great satisfaction to the Irishmen of that city. The rumor that Hon. Peter Mitchell will not be opposed by Snowball, in Northumberland County (New Brunswick) has caused much disappointment among Reformers in this city.

The Mail publishes a list of prominent Reformers who have declared their intention of supporting the Government. At a meeting held in East Huron (three hundred and twenty Conservatives being present) Farrow was again nominated.

NEW YORK, May 11.

The council of the Fenian Brotherhood issued a manifesto on Friday. It is addressed to "Irish revolutionists at home and abroad," and is very verbose. The following is an extract:—"The spirit of revolution is abroad. Every effect and gony monarchy in Europe totters on its rotten foundations. Brethren, awake! arise! and now labor with us to help on the wise ways of Providence, and to advance the good cause. Thus shall we in solemn, secret conclave, continue with augmented force to give the emphasis of dagger, fire and sword, and of other available 'resources of civilization,' to our ancient, merciless and unrelenting enemy, to destroy whom we shall use, while life endures, every means within the reach of human efforts. Let us clothe ourselves in sable; aye, in sackcloth and ashes, for our own dead, not for the enemy's. They (Cavendish and Burke) and others had better have been born dogs than answer our wrath. We proclaim our unswerving fidelity to the ancient gospel of force, and to those revolutionary principles upon which this great republic is based. We say to those most concerned, and we say it with knowledge whereof we speak: 'Beware, lest in this tramping upon the people, you tread upon torpedoes. Let our enemies look to it; they are fairly warned.' This manifesto ends with the cry, in very large type:—"God save Ireland. By order of the Executive Council of the Fenian Brotherhood, post-office box 2179, New York City."

LONDON, May 24.

Sir John Buiker, who resigned the Lord Justiceship of the High Court of Appeal, on Monday, is dead.

The steamer "Hanover," which arrived at Falmouth, on the 22nd, in tow of the steamer "Persian Monarch," has been seized to satisfy a claim of £25,000 salvage.

In the Commons this afternoon, Forster made a personal statement denying that the Government had negotiated with the suspects clandestinely. Dillon resumed the debate on the Repression Bill. He declared he had always denounced the outrages. Gladstone replied that the inciters to illegalities were responsible for the consequences. Dillon affirmed that Gladstone had declared Boycotting legal. Mr. Gladstone replied with great passion. Debate on the motion to go into committee on Repression Bill again adjourned until tomorrow on motion of Parnell. The utterance of Dillon that provoked Gladstone's attack implied that evictions were more culpable than outrages.

The race for the Derby stakes at the Epsom meeting to-day was won by the Duke of Westminster's filly 'Shotover'; Bradford's colt 'Quicktime' second; Lovillard's colt 'Sachem' third; Rymel's colt 'Bruce' fourth. The time of 'Shotover' was 2:45. Betting against 'Sachem' at the start was 8 to 11. 'Gerald' and 'Sachem' went to the post without parading in front of the Grand Stand. There was a good start at the third attempt, the American pair getting away well in front on the rails. Directly the horses settled down to real grit and gashed to the front but soon lost the lead. 'Marden' and 'Bruce' going at best were soon some lengths in front, followed by 'Pure Bearer,' 'Real Grit,' 'Sachem' and 'Quicktime.' 'Shotover' and 'Dutch Oven' were lying off with outsider 'Satrop.' Pace so far very rapid and at Furzes, 'Gerald' was beaten. Fourteen starters.

LONDON, May 20. The prospectus of a new company, called the Great North-West and Manitoba Land Company, has been issued. The capital stock of the Company is fixed at \$400,000, and the directors are the Earl of Donoughmore, Earl of Mar, Hon. Wm. Annand, John Evey, James Godson, Major Leslie, Hon. Mr. Ponsonby, Robert Manton, Sir John Ross, Newell Square, and others. The local board, with headquarters at Winnipeg, are Hon. Mr. McMeekin, Messrs. G. W. Ross and Wyatt. The Dominion Bank of Canada is the company's banker. The object for which the company is formed, as set forth by the prospectus, is the purchase, for the purpose of renting, selling, or cultivating of lands in Manitoba and the North-West. The Company has been worked up by Mr. Wyatt.

NEW YORK, May 24.

A London special says there is a complete split among the Irish members consequent upon the Kilmainham compact. The disposition shown by Parnell and his immediate followers to assist the Government, is resented by the more advanced section of the party by which the arrangement is repudiated altogether. Parnell, it is reported, contemplates retiring to private life, but the best authorities state that he has no such intention at present. All papers comment upon the significant divergence among the Irish members in the division last evening in the Commons on Gladstone's motion, that the Repression and arrears of Rent Bills have precedence over other business. Besides O'Donnell and Arthur O'Connor, those refusing to follow Parnell included Thomas Power O'Connor, Redmond, Finnigan, Rich Power, Sexton, McCarthy, Biggar, O'Sullivan, Moore, Healey, Sullivan, Leamy, Callan, and Spiel. The following abstaining with Parnell from voting on division: O'Keelley, Cummins, Lyman, Molloy, and Marum.

SHENANDOAH, PENN., May 24.

An explosion has occurred in Heckscherville colliery. Six miners were taken out dead and a number of others severely injured.

DELTON, TEX., May 24.

Early Sunday morning one hundred masked men visited the jail and took out Sam Hilton (white) and Jas. Keyes (colored) and hanged them from a tree. Both were charged with murderous assault on a deputy.

TOMBSTONE, ARIZONA, May 24.

A fight is reported on the line of the Arizona and New Mexico railroad between Mexican and American railroad laborers, in which seven Mexicans were killed and several wounded. It is expected three Americans will die.

Thomas Lepage, whose leg was amputated lately, is doing well, though still a great sufferer. Drs. McLaren and Robertson are using every available means for his comfort and restoration to health.

On Sunday, Dr. Robertson made his first appearance on our streets, since his recovery, and was heartily welcomed.

The chief points were the necessity, instrument, fruits and evidences of the new birth, wherein were set forth plain, practical, forcible truths in a heart searching, impressive manner, calculated to awaken serious thought in the minds of the hearers.
