Conductor Retires After 43 Years With Railway In P. E. I.

Many changes in railroading are recalled by Conductor Heber Bell who retired from service yesterday after working for the Canadian National Railways for over 43 years.

Born in Murray Harbour, Conductor Bell served on every Island Sub-division. He began his service as a trainman on September 22, 1914 and was promoted to conductor on March 1, 1929. Possessed of a genial disposition and always neat in his

appearance, Conductor Bell was most popular with the travelling public of the Island. Yesterday as he stepped from No. 252 after completing the run from Tignish, Superintendent George Greenough along with officials and employees of the Railroad were on hand to congratulate him. Mrs. Bell was also on hand to greet her husband on his last working run.

Regretful at bidding good-bye to their Conductor were the

members of Mr. Bell's train crew. They are St. Clair Paquet, Engineer; Jimmie Dart, fireman; Ed. Warren, Baggage-master; Spurgeon Moore, trainman.

Conductor Bell said he had no immediate plans for his retirement but as many present yesterday remarked, "He is good for another 20 years."

POULTRY FEEDING
It is general knowledge that an average hen consumes approximately 4 oz. of feed per day. Of this 4 oz. about 60 per cent

is required for body maintenance and approximately 10 per cent is wasted. This leaves about 25-30 per cent for egg production and to get highest production and the best quality eggs, one should feed a balanced ration. A balanced ration is a feed which contains all the necessary feed nutrients, in the correct proportions. No one ingredient contains all the necessary nutrients, and so a combination of feed ingredients is necessary to produce a balanced ration.

In commercial laying mash we find Fish Meal Meat Meal and Soybean Meal supplying the nutrient Protein, which is necessary for body growth and repairs as well as high quality egg white. The wheat, corn, oats and barley supply the Carbohydrates which are necessary for heat, energy and body fat. The limestone and bone meal are supplying Mineral, which is required in strong bones and good egg shell. Fish oils and Riboflavin supply the necessary Vitamins which the birds need for health strong bones and egg shells. In an egg, we know that the shell is formed by Minerals and

hen per year. In conclusion, I would suggest you make the best use of the home-grown feeds and yet have a balanced ration; that you purchase concentrates and mix them with your own ground grains in a 1:2 ratio to produce a 19 per cent Protein laying mash. This ration can then be fed along with an equal amount of round grain to produce a good economic balanced ration.
