

Lord Rideau Heads For Canada To Seek Job

LONDON (CP)—A young Englishman who once lived in Ottawa in vice-regal splendor is returning to Canada to look for a job.

Sailing for Canada today the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain is 22-year-old Shane William Desmond Alexander—Lord Rideau. For six years, between 1946 and 1951, his home address was Rideau Hall, Ottawa, then the official residence of his father, Field Marshal Earl Alexander of Tunis, former governor-general of Canada.

"I am going out to look for a job—any job anywhere in Canada," Lord Rideau said in an interview.

The trip marks the fulfilment of a boyhood vow made in 1950 by Shane and his younger brother, Brian. The boys broke up a family discussion on the Alexanders' impending return to England by announcing they had decided they were going to become Canadian citizens.

"Ever since we left Canada in 1951, I've been determined to return," said Lord Rideau. "I like everything about Canada, the people, the country, the easy informality, the sense of newness and vigor and strength."

NOT WORRIED
He admitted he had been keep-

ing a close watch on newspapers reports about unemployment in Canada.

"I've decided to go anyway. I feel certain that nothing can stop Canada's development. I don't expect to find things very easy at the beginning, but I'm arriving just about the time things should be opening up again and I hope I'll be able to get my foot in somewhere before the winter.

"In any event, I've decided to give it a good try. I'm going to stay for at least a year no matter what happens."

Shane had his first look at Canada in 1946. He attended Ashbury College in Ottawa for a year, then entered his father's old English public school, Harrow.

In 1953, he accepted a five-year commission in the Irish Guards as a lieutenant. "I've enjoyed every minute of my time in the army, but I decided I'd better get out since my heart was set on Canada."

STAY WITH MASSEY
On arrival in Canada, he will spend a few days in the familiar surroundings of Rideau Hall as the guest of Governor-General Vincent Massey. "All my Canadian friends are in Ottawa and it will give me an opportunity to see them again."

Then he intends to go to Montreal—"I'll probably be living at the YMCA"—and start looking

for a job.

His father, associated with Canada's aluminum industry, has given him the names of several business acquaintances in Canada. But the dark-haired, wiry young man indicated he doesn't intend to join his father's firm in the aluminum business, but I'd like to get into the construction business. I'll really be starting from scratch because I've had no business experience."

man to become well balanced in both mind and body."

Mr. Arsenault said that while the school as a whole was absolutely essential to the well being of the nation, it is the secondary school which is especially important. It is during these years of adolescence that character is shaped to a greater extent than in any other period of a child's life.

It is then that boys and girls are emerging into manhood and womanhood with ideals being fashioned which will largely govern their lives.

"Anything that lowers or lessens these ideals is a vital hurt while anything which heightens or enlarges these growing ideas is of great gain," said Mr. Arsenault.

TEACHER'S JOB

"A thoughtful secondary teacher," he said, "can fail to sense his or her great responsibility these days when other institutions are breaking down, the school must not only maintain its power but it must in spite of the prevailing moods of the world outside raise its standards to high levels."

Mr. Arsenault said he would like to interest more boys and girls in the French language. He said more than 60 per cent of the words in the English language came from the French.

"In the eleventh century," Mr. Arsenault said, "the people of England spoke a language called Anglo-Saxon. When William the Conqueror came to England, he shared the conquered lands with his men who became the ruling class in England."

OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

As a result of this at the English courts and in the castles of the land, only the French language was spoken and as the English knew no French and the French knew no Anglo-Saxon they had to find some way to understand each other and as time passed, the two languages blended to make the English language of today.

Mr. Arsenault felt it was very important for children to study the French language "because when they grow up they will have to decide what kind of work they are going to do."

"For those who will follow the medical profession," he said, "they will find French will be a very useful subject for they may have patients who will have no other language than French."

In the teaching profession, Mr. Arsenault said French is a great help because knowing about another people and its history and civilization throws more light on whatever he may be teaching whether it be law, history or arithmetic.

CITED FOR HEROISM

Her Majesty the Queen has approved gallantry awards for two members of the R.C.A.F. for their part in the rescue of a pair of fishermen from a sinking vessel off Canada's West coast. Flight Lieutenant Andrew G. Carswell, 34, of Toronto has been awarded the Air Force Cross, while Sergeant Ian J. McPherson, 35, of Vancouver, is awarded the British Empire Medal F/L Carswell's courage and airmanship in handling his Canco aircraft in heavy seas, and Sgt. McPherson's utter disregard for his own safety in climbing out onto the pitching wing to effect the rescue resulted in the awards. Both were based at Sea Island, Vancouver, at the time. F/L Carswell was also cited for an earlier rescue under somewhat similar conditions.

Well Known Barber In City Dies After Short Illness

The death of Mark P. Hagan, 52, well known Charlottetown barber, occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital Wednesday night following an illness of six weeks.

The late Mr. Hagan was born at Kelly's Cross, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Francis Hagan. He attended the district school and later the Barber College in Halifax following which he took up the work he was to continue the remainder of his adult life—first in Montague, then in Souris, and later, in Summerside.

In 1941, the late Mr. Hagan went to Ontario where he spent several years as a civilian employee with the RCAF being stationed at the Manning Pool, Toronto.

Returning to this City in 1949, he worked for a short period with A. E. Wilson, later joining the staff at Berrigan's where he remained until he became ill.

He was a member of the Benevolent Irish Society, and The Holy Name Society.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mary McIvor of Kinkora, and two daughters, Dianne, 14, and Gail, 11.
