Youths Plead Guilty To Break And Entry Charges

Three Charlottetown youths, ranging in age from 16 to 20 years, after pleading guilty to a total of eight charges of break, entry and theft before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queens County Magistrates Court yesterday morning. All will appear for sentence on Friday.

The three youths face sentence from charges laid against them by the R.C.M.P. in connection with breaks at three service stations—Middletons and Kitsous, both in West Royalty, and Mullins in Mt. Stewart on the week-end of February 10th. The two older members of the group face charges on all three breaks.

Another resident of Charlottetown pleaded not guilty to two counts of break, entry and theft and was remanded until Monday. His charges, also laid by the R.C.M.P., are in connection with breaks at a County Construction Garage and a farmer's barn both in Central Royalty, late last week.

The case of a Charlottetown resident, charged with illegally operating a truck not registered in the province for the hauling of merchandise, was dismissed. In all cases J.P. Nicholson was Crown Prosecutor.

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Prime Minister Will Today Outline Business Of House

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent may give the Commons today a hint as to how long the present session will last. The session is expected to end in dissolution of Parliament for a summer election.

The prime minister, in reply to a question by Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, said Wednesday he hopes to state today what additional legislation the government plans to introduce this session.

Nine items of government legislation now are on the Commons order paper. Only three of them, involving municipal grants, farm loans and Prairie farm assistance payments, are expected to cause extended debate.

Finance Minister Harris still has to bring down his annual budget but the budget proposals are not expected to be approved in time before the session closes.

Hope To Sell Wheat To Poland
OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Howe said Wednesday negotiations are being held here with a Polish trade delegation "which we hope will result in the sale of a considerable quantity of wheat to Poland." He did not say how much.

He made the statement in the Commons after Hazen Argue, CCF farm spokesman, asked about possible effects of a United States announcement the U.S. intends to sell wheat to Poland.

Mr. Howe said he can't say at the moment whether the U.S. action will affect Canada's trade position.

It was learned that two officials from Poland have been in the capital for several days.

Poland has purchased no Canadian wheat in the current crop year. In the year ended last July 31 she bought nearly 13,000,000 bushels, mostly No. 5 wheat, under a credit sale whereby the government guaranteed a one-year loan covering the deal.

Press Minister About Budget
OTTAWA (CP)—The pre-budget pressure on Finance Minister Harris is mounting daily as opposition questioners keep sounding him out on what the budget will contain.

Mr. Harris, who has not yet announced the budget date, is giving out much information.

Today, Thomas Barnett (CCF—Como-Albert) and Hon. Earl Rowe (PC—Dufferin-Simcoe) tried to find out when federal credit restrictions may be relaxed.

Mr. Barnett asked whether Mr. Harris agrees with a statement attributed to Fisheries Minister Sinclair that credit must be held to manageable proportions and that the government may soon be able to relax restrictions to approximately what they were a year ago.

Mr. Harris replied that he has "the utmost confidence in the judgment of the fisheries minister and if he made the statement it must have been after careful study of his own."

U.S.-Canadian Businessmen To Study Resources
MONTREAL (CP) — The Canadian Chamber of Commerce announced Wednesday that delegations of Canadian and American top-level businessmen will meet in Princeton, N.J., next Friday and Saturday for closed discussions on economic and resource-development problems.

The delegates comprise the Canada - United States committee jointly maintained by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Chairman of the Canadian section is Hon. Brooke Claxton, former defence minister.

Members of the Canadian delegation include: Raymond Dupuis, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce; R. B. Brennan, Saint John, N.B.; Y. R. Tasse, Quebec.

U.S. Pork Not Permitted In
OTTAWA (CP) — There has been no change in the disease situation among hogs in parts of the United States which led Canada to ban importation of U.S. pork, Agriculture Minister Gardiner said Wednesday.

So long as the disease persists, he said in reply to a question, there is no question of Canada making any change in her regulations banning pork imports.

50-Year-Old Jewellery Firm Will Move To New Location

Fifty years of active participation in the business life of this city, is the proud record achieved this year by Patterson's well-known city jewellery firm.

To mark this important milestone in their history, the firm is moving to new quarters the latter part of this week. Henceforth their store will be located in the former King Edward Hotel building on Kent St. near the corner at Queen. This property was acquired by Patterson's some time ago, and is in the process of complete renovation.

The section of the building destined to house the jewellery firm has been thoroughly remodeled and done over throughout, and has been furnished, lighted, and arranged in the modern manner, in order that their merchandise—watches, jewellery, English bone china, etc. may be displayed as conveniently as possible.

The firm was established April 10th, 1907, by C.W. Patterson, in a building on the corner of Grafton and Great George Streets, where the Capitol Theatre now stands. In 1920 the store was moved a few doors up Great George to its present location. In 1942, Mr. Patterson, who is still active in the business, took into partnership his son, Bertram W. Patterson. They are assisted in their work by Jack Cairns, repairman; Claire McWade, saleslady; and Mrs. Gwynne Patterson, wife of the junior partner.

This is commenced a new chapter in the history of this popular Charlottetown firm, thereby adding to the rapidly expanding business community centered on Kent Street.

OTTAWA (CP) — The government hopes that the report of the royal commission on broadcasting will be available within the next few weeks, Prime Minister St. Laurent said Wednesday.

Finance Minister Harris told the House he cannot say when a tariff board report on steel will be available.

Agricultural Institute Hears Lecture On Civil Defence
The P.E.I. Branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada, and the Ham Operators of the Province, met in the Armouries at Charlottetown last night. Brigadier G.G.K. Peake, D.S.O., and Major O.R. Simons discussed Tactical Conception of Continental Air Defence, and protection in case of atomic or hydrogen attack.

Agricultural Institutes throughout Canada this winter are studying Civil Defence as it applies to livestock, plants, etc. Last night's illustrated lectures were the first in a series of programs organized by the local Branch.

Brigadier Peake in the course of his remarks outlined very clearly the responsibility of individuals, and how we, as a group tie in with the Continental Air Defence. Major Simons dealt chiefly with personal decontamination. A general question period followed.

Col. J.H. Shaw introduced Lt. Col. T.W.M. Cameron of MacDonal College, Premier A.W. Matheson and a number of other guests were present. Dr. G.C. Fisher and Stuart Smith expressed the thanks of their respective groups to Brigadier Peake and his officers.
