First Annual Bible Maritime Conference Held In Nova Scotia

The first annual Bible Conference of the Maritime Fellowship of Regular Baptist Churches was held at the Clark's Harbour, N. S., Baptist church, July 22-26, with churches represented from the three Maritime provinces.

The Maritime Fellowship of Regular Baptist Churches was officially formed during the past year. For a considerable time, churches have been unaffiliated owing to their break with modernism and the extraordinary law in the Maritimes regarding Baptist church property. The increasing number of such churches, and the call of missions, led to the formation of a Fundamental Baptist association on a similar basis to that of the General and delegates met at the Riverside Temple Baptist Church at River John, on September 23, 1952, where the Maritime Fellowship of Regular Baptist Churches was officially organized. Revs. J. W. Doohan, River John, and H. C. Sweetland, of Fredericton, served as president and treasurer until April, when at Temple Baptist Church, Charles Harbour, N. B., officers for the coming year were elected. Rev. D. M. Fraser, of Central Beauce, P. E. I. was named president. Rev. M. V. Bolser, of Clark's Harbour, secretary, and Rev. H. G. Sweetland, as treasurer.

Rev. M. V. Bolser, pastor of the Clark's Harbour Church, presided. Rev. H. S. McMann of Mac's Bay, N. S. was the first speaker.

Thursday morning devotional service was conducted by Rev. J. W. Doohan. The afternoon sessions began with Rev. D. M. Fraser giving a series of expositions on the Epistle of Jude. Following a brief recess, Revs. H. B. McMann and H. G. Sweetland gave reports on a recent survey of Newfoundland, and of their visit to Toronto where they attended the Canadian regional conference of the International Council of Christian Churches, of which Dr. Carl McIntyre is president. This included an account of the birth of the Canadian Council of Evangelical Protestant Churches, of which Dr. T. T. Shields is president.

Friday morning Professor J. W. Hill of Hampton, N. B., editor of "The Evangelist", conducted the devotions, and Rev. M. G. G. of Moncton preached at night. Saturday morning Rev. Lloyd Bates conducted the devotional period, and in the afternoon Rev. D. M. Fraser presided at the business meeting.

Perhaps the highlight of the conference was the "Experience meeting" of Sunday afternoon, when men and women from every walk of life gave their personal testimony to Christ. This service was climaxed by the Lord's Supper at which the pastor presided.

Sunday evening, at the closing service, president, D. M. Fraser, thanked the pastor and the Clark's Harbour church for their hospitality, including the fine meals which were served in the Sunday School auditorium by the ladies of the church. He concluded his exposition of the Book of Jude, speaking on the theme: "Seven Portraits of Apostates."
