Universities Debate Role Of TV In Higher Education

By ALAN DONNELLY Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—Should universities turn to television to help provide higher education to a fast-growing student population? Two leading educationists gave differing replies Monday at a conference on "Canada's crisis in higher education" called by the National Conference of Canadian Universities.

Dr. Sidney Smith, president of the University of Toronto, said the televising of lectures, distribution of printed course outlines and lecture notes and other such moves would destroy the communication between teachers and students.

"We cannot streamline the learning process," he said. "We cannot teach them by the thousand."

Dr. John Ely Burchard, dean of humanities and social studies at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, replied that education by television is inevitable. If universities did not take a hand in it, they might regret the result. The issue arose as top representatives of the NCCU's 25 member universities opened a three-day discussion on problems facing higher education. Before that was a survey showing university enrolments probably will double their present size in 10 years, that teaching staff likely will be 63 per cent larger and that some \$285,000,000 will be needed for new buildings and facilities to handle the 10-year increase.

Dr. Smith, in a prepared paper, said universities cannot meet the demand "by dropping our standards, taking everybody in and showing everybody through."

"That would be simply an attempt to fool ourselves and to cheat the public," he said. Many universities were uneasy about expanding "but none will repudiate what appears to be its duty in the face of a crisis of national importance."

Turning to televised lectures, printed study aids and "production-line" methods of university operation, he said efficiency will defeat itself "if the aims of the educational endeavor are lost."

"The result of assembly-line methods would not be higher education; indeed it would not be education high, medium or low."

University training of scientists and engineers was dealt with by Dean Burchard and by Dr. E. W. R. Steacie, president of the National Research Council.

Dean Burchard said the West has been thrown into a panic by the fact that Russia is turning out far larger numbers of technologists than the leading countries of the West.

He said universities should not yield to the panic by cutting humanities and the social sciences from the educational programs of scientists and engineers.

Dr. Steacie said the universities have no responsibility for the training of technicians. And the education of engineers as compatible with university tradition only if it is based on the teaching of scientific fundamentals.

He said universities should discourage "specialization which is merely designed to enable the student to take his place in a given industry with a minimum of training."

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Body Of Missing S'ide Man Is Discovered Near Darnley

The body of Jack Small, 23 of Summerside, who was one of three young men drowned when their outboard motor boat capsized Saturday night while on a hunting trip to an island in Malpeque Bay, was discovered yesterday morning near Darnley.

The body was discovered by Harold Muttart, a member of one of the motor parties that were organized by the RCMP, about three-quarters of a mile from where the body of Ernest Morrison, 27, of Summerside was discovered Sunday afternoon.

The body of the third victim, Alex McMillan, 23 of Summerside was also located Sunday afternoon, after being washed ashore at Park Corner.

The party had left Darnley Saturday afternoon about 4:30 p.m. and had planned to spend the night on a small island and return on Sunday. They were well equipped with food, sleeping bags and shotguns which were later found in the overturned boat, secured between the double cock-pits of the decked-in top. The boat was found at the entrance to Darnley Harbour Sunday afternoon, and set off a search for the missing trio.

Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan stated last evening that an inquest will not be held.
