The breast, abdomen and legs are severely burned and the little sufferer lies in a very critical condition.

ARM BROKEN.—The Summerside papers report that a young man named Joseph Gillis, son of Mr. John Gillis, of Norboro, while working in a paper factory in Maine, lately, had his hand caught in a machine, breaking his arm in several places, and otherwise injuring him. Mr. Gillis is coming home as soon as he is able to travel.

BIG STORM.—Greenville, Texas, was visited by a heavy wind and hail storm on Tuesday night, which did immense damage to growing crops, houses and barns. A portion of the residence of J. W. Frost was blown over, killing Mr. Frost and wounding several of his family. James Marlow's residence was wrecked and Mr. Marlow was fatally injured. L. M. Shaffer's and H. H. Harris' houses were demolished, and Mr. Harris and his wife seriously injured.

AFTER THE CUP.—The English yacht Paradox, which is to contest for the America's cup, was successfully launched last week. It is said that it is more than a generation since a lugger rigged yacht has been seen in English waters. The Paradox is the largest lugger rigged yacht ever built at Eastbourne, and is the largest lugger rigged yacht in the world. The peculiarity of her hull is that it is perfectly straight at the bow and tapers off towards the rudder. She will take part in the race at Queenstown, on June 17th.

POOR SITE FOR AN UNDERTAKER.—The Truro Sun says: Only twenty adults and ten infants were buried in the Truro cemetery for the twelve months ending the 31st ult. Presbyterians, Baptists and Methodists bury their dead in these grounds. The Episcopalians have their own burying place at Terrace Hill Cemetery, and the Roman Catholics have theirs also, but from all the information we have been able to glean, we don't think that over forty persons of all ages and denominations have died in Truro during the past twelve months.

AQUATIC.—Those who purpose taking part in the rowing races on the 26th inst., appear to take great interest in their work. Since they began training, a few weeks ago, they take a run at the Park every morning at 5 o'clock, and then row over the course before breakfast. They also work hard in the evenings. A four-oared crew, as well as two double sculls were in practice on Friday evening, and appeared in good form. Joy, who has accepted the challenge thrown out to the Island by Carroll, of Pictou, was also out. His boat, built last year, by Williams, of Dartmouth, is 31 feet long, and 13 1/2 inches wide. SIR JOHN SPEAKS

On the Jesuit Act.

SUMMARY OF HIS ADDRESS.

TORONTO, June 8.

The following is a condensed report of the Premier's important speech at the Albany Club.—Sir John said there was now an excitement which, like a small cloud, threatens to spread and become portentous; but if they would take the advice of an old man who had seen many such clouds in his time, and act moderately, the minds of reason would by and by dissipate the clouds that threaten. His advice was, to be moderate in tone. "Do not quarrel with those who may temporarily differ from us; do not impugn their motives, but acknowledge, though you may not agree with them, that they are sincere, and when the clouds roll by the Conservative party will come out as strong as ever. There was no power in the Dominion but the Quebec Legislature which could repeal the Jesuits Estates Act, and if it would not do so he would say to those who were against it that he had not the slightest objection to their taking it to the highest courts, and going to the feet of the throne. The Government would put no obstacle in their way. As to any attempt by a side wind to get the Government to take action, he would say that the Government was the executive of Parliament, and after all but 13 of 281 voted that the Act was unconstitutional, the Government could not fly in the face of that vote. It would be tantamount to handing in their resignations again. He counselled his friends to moderation, urging them to keep their spirits up and in 1891, or whenever the elections came, they would give their opponents as good a thrashing as in 1887.

THE JOHNSTOWN DISASTER.

Latest News from the Scene.

PLACING THE BLAME.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 9.

Fifty-eight bodies were taken from the mines to-day, all fast advanced in decomposition. The work of cleaning away the debris is progressing very encouragingly. The workmen were not required to proceed to-day but nine tenths volunteered to continue. There is hardly any typhoid fever in town, and but little pneumonia. Fear of an epidemic of diphtheria is unfounded. Several cases of vandalism are reported to-day. Last night a number of cars containing supplies were broken into and the contents carried off. What the thieves could not steal they trampled and ruined. The Masonic relief car was entered and robbed. Twelve men were arrested for stealing, but were released upon returning the goods.

JOHNSTOWN, June 8.

The community is disposed to place the blame of the disaster on the South Fork Hunting and Fishing Club, and trouble is feared. Already several of the pretty villas have been broken into and demolished, and boats have been stolen in broad daylight and reduced to kindling wood. It is evident that robbery was not intended, for the mischief was purely wanton. Affairs at present are assuming a serious aspect. It is understood that the jury at Ninevah, after reviewing the successive breaks and careless repairs on the dam the past year, will declare the executive committee of the South Fork Fishing Club guilty of gross negligence.

Police-Constable Shot.

HALIFAX, June 9.

For many years Inverness County has been notorious for illicit whisky distilling. There have been dozens of seizures and several shooting affrays. Recently a new raid was made by Inland Revenue Collector McKay. He captured several distilleries and the properties were confiscated. Some of the parties refused to obey the subpoenas and warrants, and Police Constable Gillis was sent to arrest them. While on his way to perform that duty Saturday morning the constable was waylaid by men in ambush three miles from Port Hood, and shot as he drove along the road. Nine shots lodged in the policeman's leg, but he is not fatally hurt. The would-be murderers escaped.

Counter Claims.

QUEBEC, June 9.

The owners of the Donaldson Line steamship Cynthia have instructed their counsel to bring a counter claim against the Allans for damages in the Vice-Admiralty Court, arising out of the recent collision. The actual amount claimed will reach over \$100,000.

To Be Retained by Italy.

ROME, June 9.

Premier Corpsi announced in the Chamber of Deputies to-day that the Italian troops in Africa had occupied the Keren district, and that henceforth that district would be retained by Italy.

PARIS, June 9.

Owing to revelations in the seized Boulanger papers the High Court has ordered the arrest of Captain Fleuchal, of the war office.

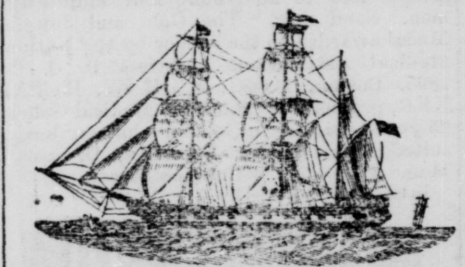
