## Revisits United Kingdom On Nuffield Scholarship

(Excerpts from letters received from flying Officer Archie J. Johnstone, of Burlington, P. E. I., now travelling in the United Kingdom on a Nuffield agricultural scholarship; continued from a previous issue.)

Most of the World War II boys who visited Glasgow will remember Mr. Matthew Armstrong at the No. 4 Overseas Service Club, St. George's place. He is still working in the same building as we knew him of old and if you want to see someone genuinely boys back, then visit old Matthew. He had been holding our mail until we reached Glasgow and was delighted to have one of his former pupils back. He is almost insistent that we come to his home for tea some night. Knowing Mr. Armstrong it is not strange that he still hears from upwards of two hundred boys from the Dominions each year at Christmas. He replies to all the cards and anyone that once knew him should drop a line some time. I once heard him described as the finest gentleman met in Scotland.

A first War veteran and former islander has the answer to all these people we meet, who say there is no opportunity left in Great Britain. He is Mr. Howard McKendrick of the Glenalden Plastic Co., Glasgow, Scotland. The name Glenalden is of course a reminder of his native P. E. I. Mr. McKendrick went to Norway in connection with World War I, later returned to Scotland and continued on with foxes there until they became more or less worthless and the advent of World War II. Being resourceful and having some imagination and a capacity for work he and his family began in plastics in a small way and have so developed their factory from the first two room affair into something quite a lot larger, requiring more space they took over an old church and converted it to a factory.
