Gives Report On Holiday Survey

OTTAWA (CP)—Paid vacations are more widespread, longer and require shorter qualifying periods than ever, a labor department survey shows. The department's report says the most notable development in regard to vacation practices have been growth in their incidence, particularly for non-office workers extension of annual vacations to two, three and sometimes four weeks a year and reduction of service requirements for entitlement to vacations.

Last year 99 per cent of office workers and 92 per cent of non-office workers had paid vacations of two weeks or more, up two and 11 per cent respectively from 1949.

Seventy-two per cent of office workers and 65 per cent of non-office employees last year became eligible for a three-week vacation, compared with respective percentages of 42 and 30 in 1949.

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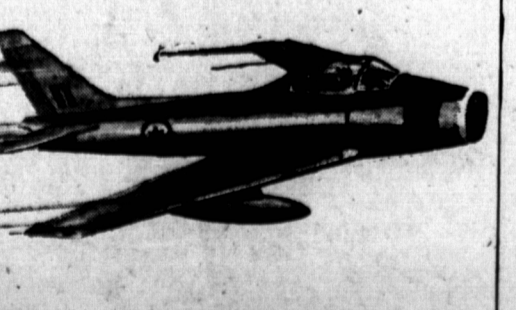
