Local and Other Items.

CIVIC ELECTIONS.—Elections in Wards Two, Three and Four to-morrow.

MAILS.—Forty-eight bags of mail matter arrived in the city this afternoon.

I. O. O. F.—Wildy Lodge meets to-night at 8 o'clock sharp. Second Degree will be conferred.

MACKEREL FISHING.—The mackerel fishery last season was a failure so far as the Americans were concerned. They caught only 11,465, against 44,762 in 1888.

A CURE FOR INFLUENZA.—The New York Board of Health furnishes the following prescription for influenza: Spray the affected membrane with a 10 per cent. solution freely and frequently, and take four or five times a day a pill made as follows: Quinine, three grains; camphor, one half grain; extract of belladonna, one-fourth grain.

DRINKS IN MONCTON.—Moncton has a novel way of disposing of its drunks. Last week a squaw was arrested for drunkenness, and as a penalty for the offence, was given the option of carrying up enough coal to fill the box in the court room, or going to jail for 72 hours. She carried up the coal and was discharged.

SHOULD BE DONE.—Persons having hydrants in front or in the neighborhood of their premises should remove the snow from about them when clearing off their sidewalks. It is but a matter of a few minutes' work, and would save the city the expense of employing a man for that purpose.

DAY OF PRAYER.—The Women's Christian Temperance Union are going to hold an all day of prayer to-morrow, Wednesday, in the Lower Parlor of the Y. M. C. A., to begin at 11 o'clock a. m., for the success of the temperance cause. Mothers of Charlottetown, rally and plead with God for His blessing on the efforts to be put forth to-morrow.

CANADIAN CIGARS.—Of the total quantity of 92,590,000 cigars produced in Canada last year, more than one half, or 47,824,000 were manufactured in Montreal. 10,739,000 were manufactured in London, Ont., 3,242,000 in Toronto, 4,585,000 in Hamilton, 3,460 in Itherville, Quebec, 2,393,000 in Sherbrooke, 2,725,000 in Beaufort, 2,415,000 in Guelph, and 3,176,000 in Victoria, B. C.

A NICE YOUNG MAN.—A young man, named Thomas Fry, living at Halifax, went home to dinner one day last week in a state of intoxication, became violent and struck his eldest sister on the temple with a shovel. When his aged mother interfered to save the girl he knocked her down and afterwards kicked her in the back of the head. The girl's wound bled profusely. Fry was arrested and given one year's imprisonment.

PILGRIMS TO STE. ANNE.—Statistics furnished by the religious authorities show that a larger number of pilgrims visited the shrine of Ste. Anne de Beupre in 1889 than in any previous year. The total number was 100,951, being 9,604 more than in 1888. There were 111 pilgrimages, 97,700 pilgrims partook of communion, and 3,047 masses were celebrated. Among the pilgrims were ten archbishops and bishops.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—The Woodstock Press says: Willard Bull, while felling a tree in the woods, last Monday, cut a top off a cedar which was in his way. When the tree fell it came towards him, and stepping back to clear it, was forced on to the stump of the cedar, which punctured his body. He was extricated from this painful position, and surgical aid summoned. He lingered, though suffering severely, until Sunday, when the injury proved fatal.

SOME STATISTICS.—The Picton News says: The forthcoming Town Report will contain some interesting figures. The amount raised by assessment in 1889 was \$15,755 in '89 as against \$13,240.71 in '88. The new law in reference to dog tax has made quite an addition to the revenue, the amount for '89 being \$160.50 instead of \$43 in '88. Out of the 114 cases before the police court during the year, 64 were directly charged with drunkenness, 21 of the remainder were simple cases of neglect, such as failure to register dogs and allowing cows to run at large.

INVENTION.—The New Glasgow Enterprise says: A. S. Ray has got out a very good little invention in the shape of a pot cover with an attachment to the stovepipe to carry off all steam and noxious smell while anything is in the process of cooking, thus saving the house from being filled with those disagreeable smells which arise from meats and vegetables while cooking. This cover can be had to fit any size of a pot desired, and can be used on any part of the stove. This attachment can also be made to the wash-boiler, and works equally as well.

SOME WHOLESOME ADVICE.—A Canadian gentleman, who has had an extensive travel, has been giving his experience in letters to the Toronto Mail. As South America is occupying a large share of attention at present it is interesting to see our own Canada compared with it. He begins by contrasting the South American cities generally with those of Canada, greatly to the advantage of the latter. The Canadian girls, he says, are on an average "far prettier, more ladylike, and healthy" than any he saw anywhere else, and his advice to all young men is to stick to Canada and they will have a much happier and longer life than they could at any place to be found in South America.

NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTIONS.

Victory For The Coalition Government.

St. John, Jan. 20.

The election was carried on in St. John city in the midst of a steady rain pour. Every canvass that could possibly secure a vote was put in force and the effect is told by the vote, and accounts for the return of the Opposition candidate and the defeat of Provincial Secretary and his colleagues. Notwithstanding the result here and in Northumberland and Westmoreland, the government will have a good working majority in the house. The successful candidates are: Albert County—Lewis and Miner, opposition; Carleton County—Atkinson, opposition; W. Ketchum, government; Charlotte County—Mitchell and Douglas, Russell Hibbard, government, by acclamation; Gloucester County—Ryan and Porrior, government, by acclamation; Kent County—McInerney and Leblanc, government; King's County—Pugsley, White, Taylor, government, by acclamation; Madawaska, Theriault, government, by acclamation; Queen's Co., Hetherington, Gilbert, W. Palmer, government, by acclamation; Restigouche, Murray, Labollois, government, by acclamation; St. John Co., McKeown, Stockton, Rourke, Shaw, opposition; St. John city, Alward, Smito, opposition; Northumberland, Robinson, Birchell, Tweedie, O'Brien, opposition; Sunbury, Harrison, government; Perley, Independent; Victoria, Porter, Independent government; Westmoreland, Melanson, Independent government; Powell, Stevens, Hannington, opposition; York, Blair, Wilson, Anderson, Bellamy, government. Ottawa Notes.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.

The House of Commons sat for a short time this afternoon.

Sir John Thompson reintroduced a bill respecting reciprocity in wrecking. Bills were introduced by Trow and Ferguson and Kirkpatrick. Before the House adjourned Sir John Macdonald replying to Mr. Laurier said the Behring Sea papers would not be brought down for the present.

Mr. McCarthy has given notice of a bill abolishing the French language in the Northwest. Choquette proposes introducing a bill to amend the Franchise Act. The Government intend asking that Canada be included in the treaty between England and France, respecting the disposal of wrecks.

Pauper Immigration.

St. Vincent, Minn., Jan. 20.

An alarming increase of pauper immigration is reported via the Canadian Pacific, from the Allan line of steamers at Montreal. Six cases of leprosy have developed in this country among immigrants.

Atlantic Mail Service.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.

It is expected that the Allan Steamship Company will get the contracts for the Atlantic mail service. They will provide steamships of seventeen knots per hour.
