Flood Control Project Slated

OTTAWA (CP)—A flood control project for the Musquodoboit River basin of Nova Scotia, costing \$536,000 during the next five years, was announced here by Forestry Minister Sarve. The federal and provincial governments will each contribute \$241,200 under the Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act program. Halifax County will contribute \$53,600. Work will begin this summer.

During the next five years, 15 retention dams will be built on tributaries of the Musquodoboit, the river channel will be dredged and obstructions to stream flow will be removed. The announcement said local farm groups have urged a start on the project for nearly 30 years. It was expected that 5,700 acres of marsh-lands would be reclaimed for farming and that sport fishing for salmon and trout would improve considerably. The area now is flooded two to four times each summer.

Armories Guards Cut 50 Per Cent

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Minister Hellyer told the Commons security guards at army armories in and near Quebec have been reduced by more than 50 per cent at an annual saving of \$600,000. He said 67 armories in Quebec, 17 in Ontario and five in New Brunswick were placed under constant guard early last year. Some had been closed later during a reorganization program.

New Rotisseries May Bring Fresh Bread To Supermarket

MONTREAL (CP)—The early morning trip to the bakery to get fresh-baked bread while it is still hot may soon be passed. You may be able to buy it in the evening at the neighborhood supermarket. A newly-developed rotisserie similar to the type supermarkets now use to sell hot chicken is equipped with pans or trays to bake frozen bread dough or pies. After baking, the bread is stored in a self-service warmer which is said to keep goods fresh and hot until a housewife picks them up. The device and other examples of new supermarket equipment and supplies were displayed at a grocery and supermarket show here. The new equipment, as well as food products and non-food merchandise, was displayed alongside an international food festival of imported, specialty and gourmet foods. The food festival, with many exhibits by foreign trade commissions and importers, had 100 booths with food products from 40 countries. In the way of food, one could

pick anything from 40 varieties of cheese in France's exhibit to Canada's canned baby beef and snake meat. For lunch counters, there was a machine that could heat frozen apple pie in five seconds and a hamburger in 12 seconds. The machine was described as "using the microwave principle to heat or reconstitute foods." Microwaves are transmitted at nearly 2,500,000 cycles a second and "these create a molecular friction in food which causes it to heat." The show's organizers say this device is a possible future boon for hurried housewives. Development of a home unit could mean that pre-cooked frozen foods would be ready for the dinner table in 10 seconds. The purpose of the food show was to win for imported foods a greater slice of the \$4,300,000,000 spent annually in Canadian food stores. The demand for foreign foods in Canada is rising and food suppliers at the show suggest one reason may be the increasing market importance of ethnic groups in Canada.

This Stowaway Faces Years Aboard Ship

SWANSEA, Wales (Reuters) — A stowaway, Milan Dosen, may have to travel back and forth across the Atlantic for years because no country will admit him, a court was told here. Dosen, 25, arrived in Swansea April 12 from Halifax, N.S. on the freighter Montreal City. He appeared in court on charges of stowing away in the ship and illegally entering Britain. He was sentenced to one day's detention and is expected to be put back on the Montreal City and taken to Canada or the United States, where he is likely to be refused entry. Counsel for the ship's owners said Dosen might have to travel back and forth across the Atlantic for years and this would cost the company "thousands of pounds." Dosen was said to have asked for political asylum and said he did not want to return to North America.

Port Freight Is Increased

OTTAWA (CP)—Freight handled at Canadian ports in January rose 2.1 per cent to 7,222,545 tons from 7,075,846 in January last year, the bureau of statistics reported in advance in its monthly summary of shipping statistics.

OTTAWA (CP)—Egg production in March rose 4.9 per cent to 39,921,000 dozen from 38,056,000 dozen in March, 1964, the bureau of statistics has reported. Production in the first three months of 1965 was up 3.8 per cent over the same period of last year.

OTTAWA (CP)—The bureau of statistics index of residential building materials prices, based on 1949 prices equalling 100, fell to 149.5 in March from 149.7 in February. The non-residential building material price index rose to 146.5 from 146.2.
