Saigon Buddhists Delighted Over Plans For Early Vote

SAIGON (AP)—Buddhists exulted Thursday at a decree of Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's military government for election of a civilian regime in South Vietnam within three to five months.

Twenty thousand staged a peaceful victory march in Saigon, which was torn by anti-American, anti-government riots before the Buddhist hierarchy called a halt and proclaimed its over-all command of the dissidents last Saturday. Thich Ho Giac, the Buddhist Institute's director of lay affairs and a co-chairman of the action committee that co-ordinated anti-government pressures, said the main Buddhist demands have been met.

Next must come the establishment of election methods, the listing of party candidates and designation of areas where voting can be considered safe. So far as could be determined, no officials have yet tackled those problems.

Ontario Milk May Be Boosted By Vitamin D

TORONTO (CP)—The Ontario Milk Distributors Association says it is considering "adding vitamin D to all milk lines."

"With Vitamin D added to all milk lines there would be no danger that children needing it most would miss getting it," said President Trevor Davies of the association.

Earlier this week Dr. Donald Fraser, a research physician at the Hospital for Sick Children here, said in an interview that failure to add the vitamin to milk is causing rickets in children. Rickets, a nutritional disturbance, can cause muscular spasms and fatal convulsions. It also can result in faulty formation and softening of the bones in infants.

Dr. Fraser, a member of the Canadian Pediatric Society, said: "I don't think it should be compulsory but by adding vitamin D the dairy industry would be performing a needed public service."

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Borders Sealed, Curfew Imposed

By DAVID LANCASHIRE BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The death of President Abdel Salam Aref of Iraq in a helicopter crash may loose a power struggle between pro-Egyptian and Arab nationalist factions, informants said Thursday.

Iraq imposed a tight curfew, closed its airports and sealed its borders. The radio in Baghdad, the capital, gave no hint of trouble although it asked the people "to be steadfast in the face of this national disaster."

When news came of the death of Aref, 45, in a crash near the Persian Gulf port of Basra Wednesday night, the man regarded widely as a possible successor to the presidency was in Moscow.

This is Aref's brother, Gen. Abdel-Rahman Aref, army chief of staff, who was in the Soviet Union on an arms-buying mission. A dispatch from Moscow said he would fly back to Iraq today.

Should the general become president, he presumably would follow his brother's policy of favoring union with President Gamal Abdel Nasser's United Arab Republic. Burned by the breakup of his union with Syria, Nasser has reacted cautiously to Iraqi merger proposals.

ARMY AGAINST NASSER Pitted against the pro-U.A.R. faction are army men and politicians who say it would be foolish to give Nasser, whose country is poor, access to Iraq's oil wealth.

Premier Abdel Rahman Basaz will be acting president until the cabinet and the defence council, both made up mainly of ranking army officers, meet to elect a president within a week, Baghdad radio said.

A state funeral was set for Saturday and a month of official mourning was proclaimed.

Killed with Aref when the helicopter crashed and burned were nine other persons, including Interior Minister Maj. Gen. Abdel Latif Daraji, Industry Minister Mustafa Abdullah, the governor of Basra province and the secretary-general of the presidential palace staff.

Annual Art Exhibition Is Underway At Centre

By JACK MACANDREW The annual exhibition of art by the members of the Prince Edward Island Art Society opened last night at Confederation Centre Gallery with a large number of artists and their friends on hand for first look at the forty nine exhibits in this year's show.

The non-jury show contains oils, watercolors, ceramic work, a wall hanging and a decorated plate and several works rendered in the new, fast drying, acrylic paints.

Every conceivable subject has come under the artists eye, and the subject matter has been rendered with a wide variety of style and technique. There are several extremely successful paintings in the exhibition, and more larger work than in previous years.

A distinct cleavage in ability is noticeable between those who may be classed as interested amateurs who paint primarily for their own amusement, and a body of semi-professional and professional artists who evidence years of training and application.

It would be appropriate in future years to somehow divide the show into classifications separating the two categories for each does nothing for the other when they are hung almost side by side.

Presumably this would also more easily permit a juried section where greater selectivity can be applied to the paintings actually hung in the exhibition. A number of Art Society members in the semi-professional category are known to favour such a move.

Many familiar names in Island art circles are represented in the show, and they have produced much of the most successful work.

Frieda Creelman is represented by two small canvases, "Father Parady's Chapel", and "Beyond the Treeline", which clearly demonstrate her quiet pastoral approach to landscape.

Dr. Eric Found, director of Tuberculosis Control and superintendent of the Provincial Sanatorium, last night gave sage advice to the graduates of the Central School for Nursing Assistants.

"My prescription for your success is made up of six ingredients," said Dr. Found in his address to the graduation held in Riverside auditorium.

"Treat your patients, and in particular, new hospital admissions with sympathy and understanding; remember they are usually afraid and behave abnormally; tactfully use your will power, be tolerant with your patients. There will be times when you will be reprimanded. If you are wrong, admit it. Have faith in yourself and in your God," he said.

Dr. Found advised that some patients will be most difficult — "remember," he said, "steadfastness of purpose is of greater importance than spasmodic effort. Guard your health; the tired sickly doctor or nurse is anything but an inspiration to a sick person."

He pointed out that nursing is not and has never been merely a job. "Today, it is a cross between a vocation and a profession and while the profession part is very important, you simply cannot become a good nurse without at least a part of that

spirit of selfless dedication that Florence Nightingale cited as a chief requirement more than a century ago.
