Margate W.I. Hostess At Convention

The District Convention of Country Line No. 1 was held in the King George Hall, Kensington, on Thursday, June 15th, with Margate Institute as hostess.

The hall was pleasingly decorated with flowering geraniums and bouquets of Snowballs, and a display of beautiful handkerchiefs including autograph quilts made by Margate, Long River and Irish-town was artistically arranged. Mrs. Alice Dougan occupied the chair, and Douglas occupied the afternoon meeting with the Institute Ode and Club Women's Creed which was followed by an address of welcome by Mrs. Leah Mayhew, Margate to which Mrs. Francis Murray of Graham's Road replied.

Roll call by the secretary, Mrs. Lea Crane was answered by the members of each institute standing, while one member gave an informal report on the highlights of the year's work.

A talk on Great Paintings was given by Mrs. Clarence Haslam of Springfield, who illustrated her comments with copies of the old masters. She said "enjoying a great painting is like enjoying a good friend... A great painting is one that gives the greatest amount of pleasure to the greatest number of people over the longest period of time." Pictures were shown one time only religious, the portraits became popular. Landscape painting came into popular use later, now almost anything is "a fit subject for a picture". The speaker gave a brief sketch of the life of Leonardo di Vinci, who made a success of many things, and will always be remembered for his Mona Lisa of the famous smile, of which a copy was in evidence, as was a copy of the Last Supper by the same artist. Di Vinci was the first artist to be able to make the landscape appear far away. Other paintings shown were "The Woman with the Water Jug, the Blue Boy by Thomas Gainsborough, painted to show that blue could be used effectively, and a study of children called Adorable by Sir Thomas Lawrence.

She also spoke of the school, and said "This year the government is helping out." For a teacher to receive first class salary, there must be seven schools in a group, when the government pays \$80.00 and the remainder is made up by the institutes. Two periods a week are taught in each school. To learn more details, she suggested that Dr. Shaw be consulted.

The Supervisor, Miss Mary Robb then addressed the meeting. Speaking first on the Music and Drama festival, she spoke highly of Hunter River's winning play, and of the "excellent Junior play from Clyde River", and congratulated Long River on their winning performers at this year's Music Festival.

Miss Robin recommended the new "one pail water system" for schools, which will be supported heavily by a government grant. She spoke of the two convention areas in Manitoba, badly affected by the recent flood, and went on to tell of public speaking courses open to men and women of 16 to 25 who must be members of a rural club or of the Federation of Agriculture. She also spoke briefly on the handicraft exhibit at Old Home Week, the best time for the annual convention. Institute cook books, which are again on sale, and the A. C. W. conference to be held at Copenhagen, where some of the subjects under discussion will be — Food and Agriculture problems, position of women in the world and world health.

Other subjects brought to the attention of the meeting were—Adult sewing classes, the jubilee endowment fund for Home Economics.
