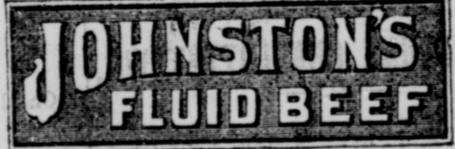

## The Markets.

Buyers report potatoes, pork, oats and eggs coming in slowly. Potatoes bring from 35 to 40 cents per bushel; oats, 54 cents; pork, 6 to 6 1/2 cents, and eggs from 7 to 8 cents. Some small shipments of eggs have been made to the Old Country already this spring.

The schrs. Eureka and Thomas Robertson are loading at Connelly's Wharf. The first-named is being loaded with potatoes, and the latter is taking in oats and potatoes for Newfoundland.

The schr. Lady Franklin is being loaded with potatoes and oats for Cape Breton at the Railway wharf by Mr. McLean, of North Wiltshire.

The schr. Turban is on her way out from Bermuda, to be loaded for that market by C. H. Schurman.

The schr. Osprey is being loaded with potatoes at Vernon River Bridge for Boston, by Geo. Forbes; and the James Semple is being loaded with potatoes for the Halifax market at Red Point Wharf, by J. A. Chipman & Co.

Mr. C. H. Schurman is loading the Morning Star with potatoes at North River Bridge for Nova Scotia, and the Laura B. is, we understand, taking in a similar cargo at Rocky Point.

The schr. Minnie May is taking in a cargo of potatoes and oats at Mount Stewart for Cow Bay, C. B. Messrs. Gillis & Clark are the shippers.

A splendid lot of cattle belonging to Messrs. William and Albert Laird, of New Glasgow, were weighed on the city scales yesterday afternoon. Of those belonging to the first named gentleman four oxen weighed 1365, 1075, 1070 and 985, one cow, 995, and a heifer 1045.

Mr. Albert Laird's portion consisted of two oxen which weighed 1197 and 1175 lbs. respectively, and a cow which tipped the scales at 1082.

We understand that they were bought by Mr. McGrath, of St. John, and shipped yesterday morning by the St. Lawrence.

The receipts of eggs at Montreal on Monday were large, and the market was steady with a slight improvement in the demand. Some choice near-by picked stock brought 12 1/2, but 11 1/2 and 12c. is a very fair range.

The Montreal flour market, at latest accounts, was working along on a firm basis. On Monday sales of 500 brs. extra at \$5 and 500 brs. superfine at \$4 75 were reported.

The Chicago hog market was slow on Monday, and prices eased off 5c. closing as follows: Light mixed, \$4 70 to \$5 30; mixed packing, \$4 70 to \$5 35; heavy shipping, \$4 65 to \$5 45; rough grades, \$4 65 to \$4 90. The estimated receipts were 25,000 against Saturday's official 11,264. There were 7,981 shipped and none left over.

The Chicago provision market ruled steady and quiet on Monday, the closing prices being as follows: Pork, \$12.97 1/2; Lard, \$13.33 1/2; July. Lard, \$6.92 1/2; May, \$7.22 1/2 July.

At Liverpool on the same day the closing prices were: Pork, 52s 6d; lard, 34s 6d; bacon, 31s to 31s 6d; tallow, 26s 6d.

According to a special cable to the Montreal Gazette, the prices of cattle in Liverpool were fractionally higher on Monday last than they were a week previous. The quotations on Monday were 3d at 6d, with a firmer feeling all round.

An exchange says: Major Bros. & Co., of Montreal, are loading 3,000 bbls of straight roller flour at Boston, and 3,000 bbls at Baltimore for Newfoundland. They are also loading 7,000 bbls at New York for the same destination, 5,000 bbls of which is low grade, and the rest straight rollers, the latter costing \$5 50 per bbl, cost and freight to St. John's.

At Toronto on Monday, the prices were as follows: Potatoes, per bag, \$1.15 to \$1.20; do, on track, \$1.03 to \$1.07. Butter, dairy, good to choice western, 19 to 22c; dairy, mediums, 14 to 17c; common and store packed, 5 to 10c; large rolls, 14 to 23c; pound rolls, 22 to 26c. Cheese, September, 12 to 12 1/2 c; summer, 10 to 11c; skims, 8 to 9c. Eggs, fresh, 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 c; hay, \$9 25 to \$9 75 for timothy, \$8 to \$9 for mixed; straw, \$6 50 to \$7; sheepskins, \$1 to \$1 45; calfskins, 6 to 8c; hides, green, No. 1, 5 to 5 1/2 c; wool 18 to 19c; chickens, 75 to 90c; ducks, 50c to \$1; turkeys, per lb, 14 to 15c; geese, per lb, 8c; onions, per bbl, \$4 to \$4 50; seeds, prime to choice, alike, \$7 to \$8 50; red, \$4 50 to \$5 00; timothy, \$1 20 to \$1 65.

In Montreal the increased demand for eggs has made the market firmer, and they are selling well at 12c.

The Montreal hog market was active on the 20th, and there was a marked improvement in business over the previous week. We quote: Canadian short cut, \$16 50 to \$17 50; western clear mess pork, \$17 to \$17 50; short cut, western, \$16 50 to \$17.

Eggs, according to the Post of the 18th, were firmer in Boston, with buyers unwilling to pay the prices asked, from 15 to 15 1/2 cents. There is a good steady demand for potatoes which range from \$1 10 to \$1 15 per bushel.

## Good News—If True.

A REPORTED BASIS OF AN AMICABLE ARRANGEMENT BETWEEN NEWFOUNDLAND AND ENGLAND.

It is currently reported in London, says a late despatch, that the conferences between the delegates from Newfoundland and Lord Salisbury and Lord Knutsford have been of a satisfactory nature to all concerned. They are leading the way to a practical and definitive agreement. The Newfoundland delegates, are understood to have submitted proposals at the conference to the representatives of the British Government which tended to greatly diminish the tension which existed in the relations between that colony and the British Government. These proposals, according to report, while demanding the total abandonment of Lord Knutsford's coercive bill, show that the delegates realize as matters stand that this can only be done in the event of the adoption of alternate means assuring the faithful performance of obligations existing between France and England. It was found impossible to accede to the demand made by the delegates for the abandonment of arbitration proposals. It is believed that the differences existing between Canada and Newfoundland have also been adjusted. Canada is supporting the policy of Newfoundland in connection with the much discussed French bait question.

Proper Time for Feeding.

The American Farmer remarks that the farmer who is up and at the barn before daylight in the winter, to give his stock a hurried morning feed before he goes away to his day's work will no doubt find them requiring another feed at noon, and again another after his day's labor is done. On the contrary, the farmer who does not go to the barn until after daylight, and who feeds leisurely, adding a little more as they eat what is put before them, until their appetites are satisfied, will not need to feed again until the afternoon, when the same course of feeding will furnish them enough to last until morning. Probably this method will keep the cattle in quite as good condition, upon less food, than would be used by the other method.
