

Mr. Pope's Reinstatement.

In our correspondent "Observer" were one of those who think that Mr. Pope was rightly treated when he was summarily dismissed from his office, it would be quite consistent in him to have written as he has written respecting Mr. Pope's reinstatement. But he admits that Mr. Pope's dismissal cannot be justified. Now, if this be true—if Mr. Pope really suffered a wrong—is it right that Mr. Pope should not receive reparation merely because his son happens to be a member of the Administration whose duty it is to see that he is justly treated? "Let justice be done though the heavens should fall," is an old saying; but our correspondent would not have justice done in Mr. Pope's case, simply because Mr. Pope's son is one of those by whom justice must be done. We have already expressed our regret that Mr. Pope is the only dismissed official whose claim to reinstatement has been recognized. It should, however, be remembered that in only one other office, from which there was a similar dismissal, has a vacancy occurred; and it is fair hardly to assume, from this single instance, that the Government have determined upon setting aside the claims of all the rest. Justice will, doubtless, be done to all.

Savage Island.

The Toronto Globe's Ottawa correspondent is entirely wrong. Savage Island was sold to the Dominion Government by Mr. Percy Pope, who is to-day its owner. The land at Cascompec, which was sold to the Dominion Government, was never owned by either the Hon. J. C. Pope or his son. The Globe's correspondent has evidently been led astray by the Patriot.

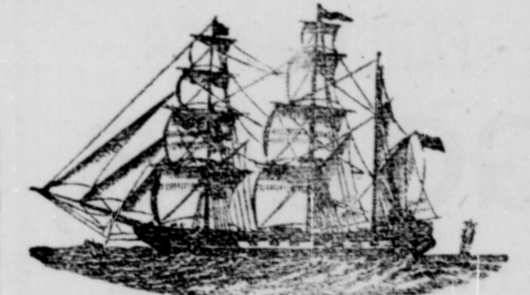
