There Is A Good Deal Of Winter Life Out-Of-Doors

By FRED CHAFE Canadian Press Staff Writer Winter isn't the best time of the year for the outdoorsman. For all its Christmas-card prettiness, it's apt to be considered by most as a time of blight.

List Ailments Of Clergymen

TORONTO (CP)—"Parson's red face," the result of wearing a clerical collar half-a-size too small "and not of secret tipping as some cynics suggest," is listed in the United Church Observer as one of seven ailments peculiar to men of the cloth.

In a satire on articles that contend ministers are endangering their health by overwork, Rev. J. A. Davidson, an army chaplain at Picton 100 miles east of here, lists what he calls the more common ministerial afflictions. The other six:

"1. The Dick-Gestetter (after the duplicating machine) syndrome—symptoms include ink poisoning, hands blistered by constant cranking, twitching of the eyes caused by watching hundreds of sheets of white paper fill by... mucilage-induced toxic inflammation of the mouth and stamp-licker's tongue.

"2. Theologian's strabismus, or squint—comes from too much reading of hallowed rubrics in old prayer books.

"3. Shrader's neurasthenia—listlessness and apathy brought on by prolonged meditation on Wesley Shrader's article, Why Ministers are Breaking Down.

"4. Mark Tapley (after the ever-cheerful servant of the hero in Dickens' novel, Martin Chuzzlewit) neurosis—strange state of

"6. Saturday night thumb—the result of spending every Saturday night thumbing through a back numbers of Pulpit Digest... the nothing-to-preach jitters."

WINTER FISHING

If that sounds too tame or chilly, and you happen to live in a province such as Ontario where fishing and hunting hardly ever close completely, you can always pull on an extra suit of long underwear and fish through the ice for lake trout, whitefish, perch or, in some places, pike. Or hunt rabbits and foxes which because of their telltale tracks, can be taken more easily at this time of year than any other.

For the utterly inconceivable, the Ontario department of lands and forests has just provided an attempt at cheering-up by announcing the 1957 fishing regulations.

They are basically unchanged, retaining the no-size-limit on bass inaugurated last year. One notable addition is the provision of seasons and size limits on splake, overlooked in 1956.
