MONTAGUE — A decision to adopt the provincial town planning plan for Montague was reached last night during the regular monthly meeting of the council. The meeting was presided over by Mayor B. H. Yeo with councillors Frank Greene, John Hughes, and Athol Robertson making up the quorum for the meeting.

Also discussed was the proposed purchase of a new fire truck which will be used for out of town fires. Since the last monthly meeting a cheque for \$2000 had been received from the previous government and further information with reference to this grant is to be asked for. The council was not clear on the matter and want to know if this is an annual grant and if this is the amount in full for the year. A letter is to be forwarded to the new minister for this information.

'Anne' Writer Harron Addresses Rotary Club

The standards and devotions of people in this city is something I have never seen anywhere else," was the comment of Donald Harron, author of the Gables and "Private Turvey" speaking at yesterday's Rotary luncheon.

Toronto born, Mr. Harron, whose career began at the age of six, has been a professional actor for 30 years. The recent experiences of his career and the complications he met with before coming here for the events during the recent filming of "The Man Who Never Was" were his main topics.

Mr. Harron mentioned that to shoot this half-hour production in Germany cost \$450,000. Incidentally, he said, to put "Anne" on the stage last summer cost approximately \$35,000.

His life in Germany during the filming of "The Man Who Never Was" involved problems which ranged from acquiring the proper attire in a store which employed young German sales ladies speaking for the most part German only, to the exciting but dangerous circumstances to which he was subjected while filming near the Berlin wall where people nearby were on occasion wounded by German guards. Mr. Harron remarked that the fear on his face was genuine.

One of the perils faced by the actor during the actual production was the scene where he was subjected to having a locomotive pass within inches of his face. This, he said, could have been accomplished in one pass, but he was required to make the same run six times which proved to be an experience that took some time getting used to.

Mr. Harron is presently writing "Spring Thaw" for next year. He said he is returning to the island in January, not only to write it but appear in it as well.

Goals has caused some high-level contemplation on the number of troops necessary to win in Viet Nam.

Leaving Saigon, South Viet Nam's capital, Sunday after talks with the top officials here, the former U.S. vice-president, Richard M. Nixon, indicated he feels 500,000 men would be necessary. It is more than likely that Nixon's statement reflects the view of the U.S. commander in Viet Nam, Gen. William C. Westmoreland, although Westmoreland has not publicly asked for more troops than now contemplated.

Within the defence department, a figure of 750,000 men has been presented, although this is probably a minority view among the military planners.

Even this high force level would not ensure any quick victory, in the view of its supporters. The pacification of South Viet Nam's enemy-infested countryside would take
