SEOUL, (CP)—Like many Western brides, winsome Hee Baik-Wha balked at being driven to the church in a jeep Friday in her long white wedding gown. She

made her Canadian army corporal husband hunt up a fancy limousine for the trip.  
It was the second marriage ceremony for Cpl. Giles Grenier of Montreal and his Korean bride, a graduate nurse.

The couple were married in a Seoul registry office 2½ years ago, but the army recently had 26-year-old Grenier come back to Korea for a second 12-month tour of duty to say "I do" to the army's satisfaction so he can take his 23-year-old wife to Canada. The first ceremony lacked official army

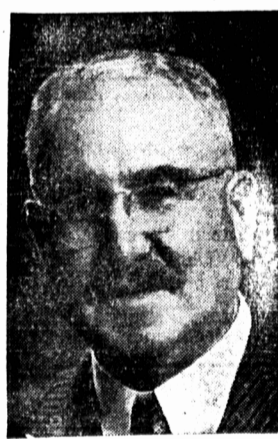
sanction.
