Jew Makes New Translation Of New Testament

(By Dave Mason) LONDON (AP) - A new translation of the New Testament that occasionally calls Jesus "chief" and the Apostles "envoys" was exhibited here Wednesday. In it, Christ's crown of thorns becomes "victor's wreath"...

The translator, Hugh J. Schonfield, told reporters previewing the work that he was moved by "a great need to promote improved relations between Jews and Christians." He termed previous translations "very bad" done, "a fat novel than the Scriptures."

Author and publisher say it is the first ever done by a Jew and the world's first non-clerical interpretation of the New Testament. Schonfield said, however, that "there are no violent changes to any fundamental thing believed to have happened."

The new translation of the Lord's Prayer reads: "Our Heavenly Father, may Thy name be sanctified. Thy kingdom established. Thy will obeyed on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our usual food, and forgive us our failings, as we too forgive those who have failed us. And do not put temptation in our way, but shield us from harm."

ADD TO BAPTISM To the story of the baptism of Jesus, Schonfield has added this passage which he said is contained in no other version: "When Jesus was immersed a bright light played over the water so that all who had come here were afraid."

Schonfield does not use the word baptism in his translation, but sticks to immersion. He said baptism was a Greek word, not Hebrew. He has also changed the order of New Testament books, starting with Mark as the oldest gospel.

NO CHAPTERS His text is not split into chapters and verses. This division, he said, did not appear in the original manuscripts. The "authentic New Testament" contains four letters to the Corinthians, Schonfield said these letters had been run together into two in the King James version. The 568-page translation has dozens of footnotes, an index, maps, and pictures. Schonfield studied scores of original manuscripts in the 30 years of research for his book which took him to Palestine, Egypt, Athens and Rome. He took five years to write it.

CHIANG SAYS WATCH '56 TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) - President Chiang Kai-shek said Tuesday 1956 would be a very important year. He did not explain. However, he recently told an interviewer he expected a third world war to break out in 1956. Chiang spoke Tuesday at a youth rally commemorating 72 Chinese killed in an abortive uprising at Canton 44 years ago.

To Dedicate Chimes At Hunter River

A service of special interest will be held in the Hunter River United Church on Sunday evening, April 3, when a set of electronic chimes will be dedicated. These have been made possible as the result of a bequest to the church from the late Mr. William Darke of Hunter River, and a gift from Mrs. J. S. MacLeod in memory of her husband.

The late Mr. Darke resided in Hunter River for a number of years prior to his death, and was a member of the Board of Stewards. The late Mr. MacLeod was for many years post master in Hunter River and took an active interest in all church work. The chimes will be dedicated as "Memorial Chimes."

The equipment, consisting of an amplifier, tower speaker and record player, has been installed this week. A microphone has also been set up as a permanent part of the equipment, and outlets have been placed in the basement so that small speakers may be used there when the need arises. It is expected that the chimes will be heard throughout the village as well as some distance outside.
