Car Companies Boost Warranty

TORONTO (CP) — Three major Canadian car makers will offer a five-year or 50,000-mile warranty on the power

train of their 1967-model cars and light-trucks. General Motors of Canada Ltd., Ford Motor Co. of Canada Ltd. and American Motors (Canada) Ltd. made the announcement after a similar statement was released by the parent-companies in the United States Wednesday night.

Chrysler Corp. and Chrysler Canada Ltd. have had a similar warranty since 1963.

The power train includes the engine, transmission, drive line and rear axle.

GM, Ford and American Motors said other parts of the vehicle, excluding tires, will be covered by a two-year or 24,000-mile warranty. Chrysler offers a one-year or 12,000-mile warranty on other vehicle parts.

Archbishop Comments On Church Unity

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Most Rev. Michael Ramsey, Archbishop of Canterbury and world leader of 44,000,000 Anglicans, said here he believes there ultimately will be one Christian church, but unity now is prevented by doctrinal differences. The archbishop made the comment at a brief news conference from Halifax while on a tour of Canada. The archbishop said examples of the differences are the Roman Catholic doctrines of transubstantiation and the assumption of the Virgin Mary. He said he thinks the differ-

ences can be overcome, but not quickly.

"There are things to which the Anglican Church is pledged because we believe them to be not peculiarly Anglican things, but fundamental principles coming from the primitive church."

He listed them as the holy scriptures, the creeds, the sacraments and the historic episcopacy.

WOULD BE VARIETIES

"We would not go into any scheme of unity without these four things. . . . I believe that ultimately there will be one Christian church, though I'm sure that it will be a church containing varieties of customs and varieties of forms."

Asked if he thinks there would be room in such a church for the papacy, he replied: "I think that in the united church of the future, the Bishop of Rome might have a place as presiding amongst equals — a presiding bishop amongst equals."

The archbishop was to be given a steak dinner Friday night at Memorial University at which Premier Smallwood was to be guest speaker.

He will be in Newfoundland for four days on the first visit by an Archbishop of Canterbury in the more than 350 years the Anglican Church has been established on the island.

Memorial University is to award him an honorary degree Sunday.

He received a doctorate of divinity Friday from the University of Kings College in Halifax where he spoke at convocation exercises.

Tobacco Co. Net Earnings Show Decline

MONTREAL (CP) — Imperial Tobacco Co. of Canada Ltd. reports net income of \$5,806,000 or 58 cents a share for the first half of 1966, down from \$6,511,000 or 65 cents a share in the first six months of 1965.

Share earnings are as reported by the company after provision for preferred dividends. This is the first time the Montreal-based company has issued an interim report.

The company said the decline of almost 11-per-cent in net income was recorded despite an increase of nearly three per cent in sales. The profit decline was attributed mainly to higher costs of leaf tobacco, increased wages, and higher cost of supplies.

Net sales for the six months ended June 30 were \$179,957,000 compared with \$175,303,000 for the same period last year.

The company announced Friday a raise in the price of its cigarettes to wholesalers by 43 cents per thousand for king-size and 31 cents per thousand for regular size.

Tranquillizers Can Damage Heart Muscles

LONDON (Reuters) — British and American research into the long-term use of tranquillizers showed they could damage the heart muscles, Professor Eleanor Zaimis Monday told the British Association for the Advancement of Science meeting.

She said work at London's Royal Free Hospital School of Medicine has shown that for patients under continuous treatment with tranquillizers the harmful effects could offset the beneficial.

The British pharmacologist said a group of American pathologists have made systematic investigation of the effect of long-term treatment with the drugs after the deaths of patients in a 2,000-bed hospital.

They found degenerative changes in the conditions of the patients' heart muscles unlike any previously described, she said.

"It is important to find out and make widely known the possible damage which a prolonged course of drug treatment may entail," she said.

Sea Memorial Is Planned

OTTAWA (CP) — A memorial for some 3,300 soldiers and sailors lost at sea in the First and Second World Wars will be erected in Point Pleasant Park in Halifax, the government has announced.

The memorial will be a granite cross mounted on a podium with the names of the missing on panels of bronze, the available to ships entering Halifax harbor.

Decision to erect the memorial was taken jointly by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and the government. The Royal Canadian Legion and the National Council of Veterans' Associations approved it.
