Will Attend Youth Leadership Camp



Dick Noonan, 16, (shown above) son of Mr. and Mrs. Preston Noonan, Summerside, has been recommended by the Summerside High School, and has been selected as Prince Edward Island's representative at a two weeks youth leadership camp in Ontario.

For several years the Physical Education branch of the Ontario Department of Education has been operating, during the summer, a camp for youth leadership training. This has been a successful and satisfactory experience for the participants. Four two week courses have been operated, with 120 leaders attending each course.

Recently, the management of McCormick's Limited, a biscuit and confectionery firm located in London, Ontario, has been interested in this program and has offered to make available sufficient money to cover the travel expenses of one boy from each Province to attend this camp for youth leadership training.

The Ontario Department is prepared under this project to enroll one boy from each Province without charge. The camp will be held August 1 to August 14 at Longford Mills, Lake Couchiching, Ontario, in an extremely attractive location about ninety miles north of Toronto, and accessible by rail and automobile. The boys live in permanent cabins, not tents.

Swimming facilities are excellent, as are food and other services. There is an instructional staff of nine, a maintenance staff of three, with a nurse in attendance and a doctor on call.

Concluding Sessions Of Baptist Convention

The sessions of the 85th annual United Baptist Association convention continued on Saturday morning in the Knutsford Church with the Rev. J. D. Davison of Charlottetown giving another of his inspiring messages. He spoke on the text: "I am the life". Rev. Donald McClare of East Point was welcomed as a new member into the association. This is Mr. McClare's first visit to the island and he and his wife were officially welcomed.

Rev. E. M. B. Wheelock, secretary for the British and Foreign Bible Society was then heard in an excellent report. The Bible Society was organized in 1804, and in P. E. I. in 1837. It is looking forward to its 150th anniversary in 1954. There are many Bible Societies in the world of which the British and Foreign Bible Society is the largest. Some 19 Bible societies of the world have banded together to form "The United Bible Societies of the World".

The British and Foreign Bible Society exists to distribute the Scriptures or portions thereof in all the languages of the world, without note or comment. Last August, one boy has been selected from each Canadian Province to participate in the activities of this youth leadership course. Dick will leave sometime around the end of July by T.C.A. for Ontario.

Dick is a member of the Students' Council of the Summerside High School, and is a good student. He is very active in sports and excels in swimming, in which sport he now holds three Island championships.

On Saturday afternoon in the O'Leary United Church, Rev. J. D. Davison concluded his moving and inspiring devotional addresses on "No Man Cometh To The Father Except By Me." These fine sermons have been a source of spiritual thought and have started every session on a very high plane.

One of the finest missionary addresses in a long time was delivered by a native Indian minister, the Rev. A. B. Maslamani. He brought greetings from the Baptist Convention of India and from the Baptist Convention of South East Asia comprising India, Burma and Ceylon. In India ten millions out of 400 millions are Christians. The young minister stated that they were proud of the missionaries sent to India. They were indeed "veritable ambassadors of Christ".

He gave a comprehensive picture of all the fields of missionary endeavour in India and throughout the world. He stressed the fact that there is a great opportunity in India and he issued a great challenge for more workers saying that the ambition, the aim, and the dream of Christians is "India for Christ." He said to the association "You made us what we are. You gave us our start." He made a deep impression on the capacity congregation.

The W.M.S. groups of the O'Leary United Church was extended to the Baptist W.M.S. by Mrs. Dan MacPherson. A welcome from Mrs. Springfield-Knutsford W. M. S. groups was extended by Mrs. Ralph Adams. These greetings were cordially accepted. A fine worship service was conducted by ladies from the Springfield W.M.S. The theme was "The missionary task of the church." Mrs. MacLean was heard in a fine solo. Three ministers' wives were welcomed: Mrs. Donald McClare of East Point, Mrs. M. Waterworth, Cavendish and Mrs. A. J. Archibald, Montague.

Fine reports were then received of the work done in the Baby Mission Bands, report of treasurer etc. All reports showed progress. On the platform was Dr. Clark, a retired missionary, and presiding over the meeting was Mrs. McClare.

The next main speaker of the afternoon was Miss Bertha Myers, Halifax, now retired who served in India from 1916 to 1950. She was dressed in the native Indian costume. She also sang several hymns in the Indian tongue. She remarked it was 31 years since P.E.I. had sent a missionary to India. The first was in 1921 when Miss Laura Bain was sent. She made an earnest and most effective appeal for more workers. She remarked that she was present at the birth of a nation, in fact two nations born in one nation. Hope of India is in the young. We should first give ourselves to service and prayer, then give our gifts.

Mr. Brinton, this Bible training school will continue to render a wonderful service to the church.

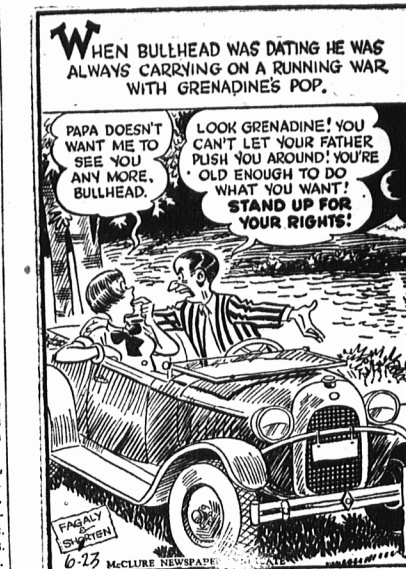
The convention evangelist, Rev. L. R. Atkinson, is a clear, forceful and convincing speaker. He delivered a stirring address on "Evangelism". In his evangelistic services he reached 27,000 people with the message of salvation. There were 426 first time decisions for Christ. He sounded a clear note of optimism and said there are three evidences of a great outpouring of the holy spirit, but stated that much yet remains to be done. He asked several pointed questions: "Is your Christian experience better this year than last?" "Are you a better Christian?" "Is your prayer life better?" "What about family worship?" "Have you grown in grace and in the power of Jesus?"

The spacious O'Leary United Church was filled on Sunday morning when a most inspiring sermon was delivered by Rev. W. G. Killam of Summerside. His sermon was "The Living Christ". The Rev. Harry Barber presided. The Scripture was read by Rev. W. G. Dickson. Prayer was offered by Rev. W. G. Killam. The choir with Mrs. Silliker at the organ, was heard to advantage in a sacred number. It was a very impressive service.

On Sunday afternoon, at 2:30 in the O'Leary United Church there was another very large congregation. The Moderator Rev. Harry Barber presided. Prayer was offered by Rev. C. O. Howlett. The choir under the direction of Mrs. Watson Silliker sang a special anthem and there was a splendid duet by Mrs. Donald Macdonald, daughter, Mrs. Donald Macdonald. A fine sermon was preached by the superintendent of home missions the Rev. R. E. Whitney of Wolfville, N. S. who spoke on the text "Put on the whole armour of God". Rev. 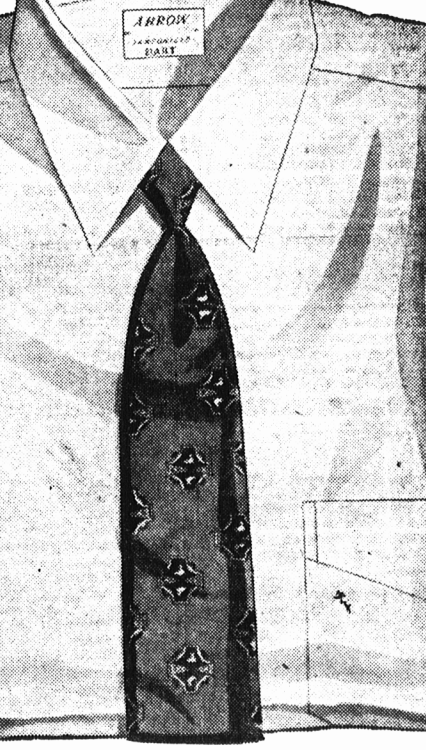
