## Perjury Ascribed To A. C. Taschereau

Duplessis Delves Into School Commission Interest Payments to Accountant—Details of Resignation.

QUEBEC, June 13—Premier Taschereau gave instructions Tuesday to announce the resignation of his brother, Antoine C. Taschereau, as accountant for the Quebec Legislative Assembly.

The Premier sent word of the resignation to the Public Accounts Committee almost at the time that bank officials were disclosing how the brother had received interest on funds entrusted to him by the government and by the Quebec Catholic School Commission, of which he was secretary-treasurer.

No details of the resignation were revealed, and Opposition Leader Maurice Duplessis declared the committee should have been informed by the Premier on "terms of the resignation" and whether the former accountant would receive a pension. But "particularly," said Mr. Duplessis, "we would like to know if he made, or if he is going to make, restitution."

Mr. Duplessis also said he wished to draw attention of the Attorney-General to the evidence of the accountant who previously said he had drawn no interest on the school funds while in the office, chief inspector for Banque Canadienne Nationale, said "it would appear" Antoine C. Taschereau had benefited personally from the interest payments.

Evidence was adduced to show a man described as an international-known confidence man had misled two persons of \$60,000 while he occupied the apartment of Georges L. Dussault, secretary of the Attorney-General's Department.

Mr. Dussault told Mr. Duplessis he was absent in Europe in 1929, and that his apartment was rented during his absence on the same basis as a hotel suite. When he returned, he said, he learned the occupant was a "crook," and said he had "done everything possible to convict him."

The secretary said he had "no knowledge to that effect," when

asked by Mr. Duplessis if he was aware the confidence man had "paid the Attorney-General's department \$2,000 of the stolen money to escape going to penitentiary."

From L. A. Richard, Deputy Minister of Colonization, Mr. Duplessis sought to learn if the department ever had paid for clothing or Irene Vautrin, former Minister of Colonization, defeated in last November's general election. The deputy minister said as far as he was aware the only clothing ever paid for by the department for the Minister was an outfit in which Mr. Vautrin planned to make a tour of bush settlements. He promised to check the records and provide any details available.

PROBE OF ALL DEPARTMENTS  
All departments would come under scrutiny of the accounts committee, Mr. Duplessis declared, and "any attempts by the Government to delay this inquiry will prove futile. We have put before the public only a fraction of the scandal we intend to prove."

Mr. Duplessis read a letter signed by Antoine C. Taschereau, mailed to the bank in 1924, in which the writer asked that in future the interest on the School Commissions funds be credited to the commission and not to him personally.

"Does this mean that prior to 1924, Mr. Taschereau, a brother of the Premier, benefited personally from the interest on funds of the School Commission which he deposited in the bank?" asked Mr. Duplessis.

"It would appear so," replied the inspector.

"Then the other day when Mr. Taschereau swore he never received the interest on the funds of the School Commission he committed perjury?" continued the Opposition Leader.

"I don't know about that," said Mr. Duplessis, turning to Attorney-General J. E. Perras.

The opposition leader read several letters which he said revealed the difficulties that arose between inspectors of the bank over the practice of paying Mr. Taschereau the interest on Government funds. He also read one letter from the son, Jean Thomas Taschereau, manager of the branch where the father deposited the funds. The letter said the law permitted the accountant of the Assembly to administer personally the funds and to draw the interest.

Another letter was read from the accountant to Henri Desrivieres, superintendent of the bank in Quebec, complaining that Mr. Taschereau was "tired of being bothered by the inquiries by the inspectors every year" concerning payment of interest on the accounts. He also threatened to transfer the accounts to the Bank of Montreal where he said he "previously had never experienced any difficulty."

DATE RARS  
One cup sugar, 3 egg yolks, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 pound dates cut fine, 1 cup walnuts, 3 egg whites folded in last.  
Beat the egg yolks, then add sugar, then flour, baking powder and salt, which have first been sifted together. Add chopped dates and nuts, and, lastly, the stiffly beaten whites.  
Spread on a buttered shallow pan and bake in a moderate oven (300 F.). Cut in bars two inches long and half-inch wide, and roll well in powdered sugar.
