

# Received Offer For Large Canadian Butter Shipment

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has received an offer for some 3,000,000 pounds of surplus butter for shipment overseas, it was learned Monday.

An informant said the first price proposed by the butter dealer who made the offer is too low but that negotiations may be reopened if the dealer is willing to increase his price. Name of the dealer and prices involved were not disclosed.

It is understood the dealer planned to ship the butter to West Germany. From there it might be reshipped to other points, perhaps to Iron Curtain countries.

Under a previous deal, some 300,000 pounds of Canadian butter

were shipped to Communist Czechoslovakia. The Czechs got the butter for 37 cents a pound, 21 cents below the federal support price of 58.

The government is believed to be still holding some 40,000,000 pounds of surplus butter carried over from production last year. Many millions of pounds more have been added from surplus 1955 production.

## Working Hard For 150 Blood Donors At Morell

For the first time in almost two years, Morell is to have a Red Cross blood donor clinic in the community hall next Tuesday afternoon, August 30th. For this clinic, St. Peter's Bay and Mount Stewart, as well as all the adjoining districts of each of these centres, have been asked to share in providing the 150 donors required during the two hour period. Each district has been given a proportionate number of the total objective to achieve. Representatives of many different organizations in the environment are working to enlist a record number of donors for the Morell clinic.

Many people living in these localities have benefited by receiving free blood transfusions during the past two years and can be counted on to influence friends, relatives and neighbours to be donors at Morell next Tuesday afternoon and in this way help to reduce Prince Edward Island's debt of 1,000 bottles.

Living Costs In U. S. Climbing

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government reported Tuesday that living costs in the United States rose in July for the second straight month.

Seasonal higher prices for food and most types of services raised the consumers price index 3-10ths of one per cent, an increase sufficient to provide a penny-an-hour pay raise for about 650,000 workers of the General Motors and Ford motor companies. They have labor contracts gearing wage rates to changes in the government's index.

Costs of housing, household operation, medical care and personal care reached record levels.

spoonful of this solution on the sow's food daily.

**RICKETS OR CRIPPLING**

This common trouble chiefly attacks pigs from 2 1/2-3 months of age and is due generally to calcium deficiency combined with a lack of vitamin D. The condition is first noticed when the pigs show inactivity, rough coats and pain in the joints. It develops rapidly. The affected animals exhibit great pain when they move. Sometimes convulsions occur. The legs become crooked and the joints enlarged. Death may result from complications such as pneumonia or diarrhoea. Pigs that have been affected even slightly, are seldom thrifty in later life.

Calcium is the mineral usually deficient in grain rations. This can be supplied in the form of ground limestone, which may be included in a reliable supplement such as that described below. Vitamin D is supplied by direct sunlight, which is the cheapest form obtainable. In its absence one tablespoonful of a reliable feeding oil must be given daily until the pig is 100 pounds in weight.

## 6-Year-Old Boy Drowned In Accident At Naufrage

A 6-year-old child, Barry Roderick MacDonald, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Roderick Stephen MacDonald, was drowned at Naufrage about 6:30 p.m. Monday evening, when the tricycle on which he was riding went over the edge of the wharf into deep water. The young boy had been accustomed to coast on the inclined wharf, and had been removed on several occasions by his mother. On Monday evening he ventured on the wharf for a coast and there being no Header on the wharf, the child fell into the water.

Dragging operations were continued throughout the night by members of the R.C.M.P. Detachment of Souris. The body was found at 7:30 a.m. yesterday morning by J.J. O'Hanley and Albert Richards.

Dr. G.S.A. Inman, Montague Coroner, was called to the scene, and the body was identified by Stephen MacDonald, a cousin of the young boy's father. Dr. Inman decided an inquest was unnecessary.

## Mother Attempts Assault In Murder Case

VANCOUVER (CP)—The grief-stricken mother of a youth who was kicked to death in a Saturday-night street brawl leaped from her seat in the coroner's courtroom Tuesday and attempted to attack the man charged with her son's murder.

"I'll kill you," Mrs. William Holman screamed as she rushed toward the front of the courtroom where Robert Graham, 24, of Vancouver was seated.

Graham is charged with the murder of Mrs. Holman's 21-year-old son, William.

Inquest witnesses identified Graham as the man who was involved in a fight with Holman near Kitsilano beach Saturday night. Witnesses said Holman was knocked down and kicked on the head.

Mrs. Holman, holding a glass vial with the broken off, charged at Graham from the rear of the courtroom. She was stopped by police officers and a police matron and led from the courtroom.
